

TAB BENOIT

Tab Benoit is a Grammy nominated singer, songwriter and guitarist who has built a remarkable 30+ year career on the foundation of his gritty and soulful Delta swamp blues, acquiring a devoted legion of Florida fans along the way, as well as 5 Blues Music Awards, including BB King Entertainer of the Year (twice) and an induction into The Louisiana Music Hall of Fame.

A guitar player since his teenage years, Benoit appeared at the Blues Box, a music club and cultural center in Baton Rouge run by guitarist Tabby Thomas. Playing guitar alongside Thomas, Raful Neal, Henry Gray, and other high-profile regulars at the club, Benoit learned the blues first-hand from a faculty of living blues legends. He formed a trio in 1987 and started touring more of the United States in 1991

In 1992 Benoit released his first recording *Nice and Warm* on the Justice Label. The title track became a AAA Radio hit and Benoit's touring career kicked into high gear. Nice and Warm prompted comparisons to blues guitar heavyweights like Albert King, Albert Collins and even Jimi Hendrix. Tab began playing two-hundred and fifty shows a year, a schedule he has kept up for over twenty years. He recorded four albums for Justice Records before being signed to the Vanguard label, and became Louisiana's Number One Blues export. Vanguard allowed Tab to produce his own recordings; Tab



wanted to record the sound that he was trying to create and in 1999 Vanguard Records released *These Blues Are All Mine*

Tab Benoit's music evolved again after he signed with the Telarc International/Concord Music Group in 2002. He was also on a mission in wanting to use his music and his energy to bring attention to Louisiana's coastal erosion issues. Tab began to spend more time in the Wetlands, and it was where he began to write his songs. Wetlands was the title of his first Telac/Concord International release. The record combined many musical styles that are indigenous to Louisiana, while he began to play accordion lines and washboard on guitar. Wetlands was a mile marker that definitively marked Tab's further musical progression into his own original sound and style.

Following the release of *Wetlands* in 2004 Benoit founded the *Voice of the Wetlands* non-profit organization and began to use music and gather other musicians to use their platforms for getting the message out. He put together an all-star band that featured Cyril Neville, Anders Osborne, George Porter Jr, Big Chief Monk Boudreaux, Johnny Vidacovich, Johnny Sansone, and Waylon Thibodeaux.

Benoit recently launched his own imprint, *Whiskey Bayou Records*, with partner and manager, Rueben Williams. The label has thus far released albums by such established artists as Eric McFadden, Damon Fowler, Eric Johanson, Jeff McCarty, and Dash Rip Rock. In 2019 Benoit hits the road for a major U.S. Tour, the *Whiskey Bayou Revue*, featuring Benoit and several of his label's artists.

39th Annual Melbourne Art Festival



PAUL STANLEY

(of KISS) Interviewed!

have a Kiss box set with all their television appearances ever. I have a Kiss belt buckle. There is a Kiss clock hanging on my wall, and there is a robotic Gene Simmons doll watching over me as I write this. I might be a fan. So, you can imagine my thrill when I was offered the chance to interview Paul Stanley, one of the co-generals of the Kiss Army and lead singer of the band itself. Paul is touring through Florida with his art now that the band has finished their very last tour ever. We finally found the time to chat. Here is what happened.

Hi Paul! How is your day going so far?

PS: Well, I just woke up. It's 8 am in L.A...

(It did not occur to me that elite rock gods of the universe sleep...)

I would like to talk about your art a little bit. A lot of people may not know that you are an accomplished painter. Can you talk about when and how you got into painting, and of course what inspires your art?

PS: Well, my mother was born in Germany, and my father was from Poland. They both fled the Nazis and landed in New York before I was born. Because of our heritage, art has always been an important part of our lives whether it be music or painting or what have you. I have been an art lover my entire life; music was just the path of art I chose to pursue first. Anyway, there was a time when I was going through some stuff in the early 2000s, and a friend of mine said "hey man, why don't try paint-

ing" which was not the kind of thing he would normally say, so I was taken back. But I though, why not. I went out and got some canvases and paints and everything and gave it a shot. At first, it was just stream of consciousness kind of stuff, just letting my emotions run out onto the canvases. Then, after awhile, I started seeing shapes, and then I was painting people and myself. It became part of my life and when the band wasn't touring, I would take time to paint, and it felt good.

Oh Paul! Are you in a band too? Like a hobby thing on the side?

PS: Yeah, yeah, me and some friends get together occasionally! (*laughs*) So, I had a couple of my pictures hanging up in my house and someone asked me who painted them. I said I did, and they were impressed.

And now you are showing in galleries all around.

PS: I am. And I'll tell you something. I never thought people would one day be buying my stuff, but the paintings are selling for higher prices than a lot of established artists and that floors me. (Paul's paintings are selling for upwards of \$80,000 each)

To me art is about what you like. People try to claim they know what is good and what isn't, but it's about what the artist is saying and if that speaks to you. I tell people all the time, if you don't like my stuff go home and make something you do. Art is for everyone

Like wine. What makes a \$200 bottle of wine any better than a \$10 one? It's what you like best.

PS: Exactly! I'll be the first to tell you I don't know much about wine, but I do know what I like.

Ok, let's talk about your side project Kiss. You just finished your last tour ever, The End of the Road, at Madison Square Gardens in December. You were originally slated to "retire" a couple of years earlier, but the pandemic hit and cut the tour short. You could've closed up shop for good, but you came back two years later and finished.

PS: Oh, yeah! We had to come back and finish the tour. We had to celebrate with all the people that made it possible for us to do what we do. We did 250 shows around the world. If we had cut the tour short, we would've disappointed so many people including ourselves. We needed to go out with thunder and lightning. There was no question about finishing our last tour.

You have living this life for half a century. Do you think you miss it?

PS: Of course I'm gonna miss it! But the reality is no one beats the clock. If we were playing in jeans and t-shirts, we could play into our 80's, but our show is so athletic. We're running around with 40lbs of gear on making it look easy. There are no pro athletes still competing in there 70s and 80s. There had to be a stopping point and that was it.

Was it hard to put Star Child away? How much of Star Child is you and how much is persona?

PS: Star Child is a big part of my life and who I am, and will continue to be so. Kiss will never go away. Kiss is a phenomenon that will continue long after me and Gene and the boys are gone. So, even though you may not see me as Star Child anymore, he is still there. He is just another side of me; another part of my overall person.

I know the answer to this already, but when you guys were just kids, putting this band together back in NYC, did you have any inkling that 50 years later it would have become such an iconic cultural fixture with millions of fans spanning multiple generations? I mean, I have been a member of the Kiss Army since I was 6.

PS: First off, thank you for your ser-



vice, it's much appreciated! There was no precedent for a band to stay together that long when we were coming up. At the time, the Beatles were the longest running show in town, and they didn't stay together nearly as long. So, we had no template to say "hey, maybe that'll be us someday." We just wanted to play music for as long as we could, whatever that meant.

Now that you guys are done touring do you still keep in touch with each other. You have spent your entire lives together, particularly you and Gene, I just wonder has it been a business relationship? Are you close or is it a Hall and Oates kind of thing?

PS: I was with Gene just yesterday hanging out. Gene and I couldn't be closer if we were actual brothers. Like you just said, we have been together our entire lives, and I couldn't imagine us not being as close as we are. Our families are completely meshed as

well. Our wives are great friends and all our kids are like siblings. Nick, Sophie (Gene's kids) and Evan (Paul's oldest son) have been tight all their lives, too.

Having had such a long and successful career you must have a unique perspective on how the music business has changed and evolved through the years. Can you talk about that?

PS: Oh yes, it has changed quite a bit. It used to be that the people running the record companies were real music fans; people who really cared about it. It was normal to pick up a new artist and know they needed time to grow and evolve, maybe even like two or three albums worth of time. Now it's all about how much money you can make with your first album, not even that, how much can you make with your first single. The people running

the companies are all number crunchers now

Your oldest son Evan is making a splash with his band Amber Wild right now. They even opened for you on the last tour. Do you see anyone else on the scene right now that has the ability and staying power to be the next big thing; the next Kiss as it were? Who is still going to be filling arenas 50 years from now?

PS: Let's be clear - there will never be another Kiss. But there are some pretty great bands and artists out there. Back when we started, you could play all the bands out there on the radio in a day. There is so much music now, it's hard to even keep up with it. A lot of the greats are still around too, so let's not count them out just yet.

Who are you listening to right now? Who turns you on?

Cusip Conspiracy

Well, I really went down the rabbit hole on this venture. As of late, I've been seeing advertisements and articles online about using personhood or "strawman" theories to clear out all your debts or take a vacation or buy a warehouse full of twinkies or whatever you want. How do you access this amount of cash? Apparently, the federal government has a secret account that is set up for everybody when you are born. This falls under the auspices of "Sovereign Citizen" movement. The theory goes something like this:

In 1933, FDR took the U.S. off the gold standard because of inflationary pressures caused by the great depression. The theory is that the U.S. was basically broke, so we became a corporation instead of a Democratic Republic. The corporation of the U.S., then started using birth certificates as kind of warehouse receipts sold on the international bond markets, making each child part of the "chattle" of the corporation. This is also known as the "Strawman" theory as each real person had two identities; your actual flesh and blood identity, and your bond or "strawman identity." Now, why was this assumed to be true? Because a birth certificate contains 1. Your name in all capital letters (this will be important later), and 2. A cusip number. Oh, no! There's a cusip number on my certificate of birth! Ok, what's a cusip number. Basically, a cusip (cusip stands for Committee on Uniform Securities Identification Procedures) number is a 9 alphanumeric unique number assigned to stocks, bonds, and financial papers and other securities in the U.S. and Canada. It makes it easier to keep track of. So, the theory goes, since there is a cusip number on a birth certificate, it must be a financial instrument, in this case a bond. Being a bond, it therefore must have a financial value.

This is my first disagreement with this theory as cusip numbers are not typically used on birth certificates. You can, however, file a UCC-1 form with the Treasury Department and get a cusip number, but it's a long process.

So the conspiracy continues. All manner of financial transactions, taxes, paying bills, etc., comes under the prevue of the "corporation", which is why your name is always in all capital letters on tax statements, bank docu-

ments, bills, or any activity of commerce. I thought it was because the CapsLock was stuck, go figure! Anyway, now the trick is to separate yourself from your actual self and your strawman persona. Amongst a lot of other paper work you should do this with a lawyer, you use the above mentioned form UCC-1, which creates a financial statement and establishes a security interest in personal property. Then you make claims about your sovereignty and birth certificate.

This is my second point of contention with this theory. Your birth certificate is a legal document used to authenticate date of birth and citizenship and not associated with financial transactions, etc. This would be a good place in the process to consult a lawyer who is an expert in these matters.

So after you file all these things and certify this and that, and denounce your birth certificate, you file a discharge bond. This bond is used to pay all debts. The bond is backed by your strawman account held by the Federal Government. Another benefit of this is that you're not bound by such menial laws such as requiring a drivers licence to drive, or paying taxes. Again I have some qualms about this, too. Where do you draw the line? Is it legal then to go into a store and take stuff? Is it now legal to shoot someone? Can you legally run a stop sign now?

I've just touched on some of the things involved in becoming a "Sovereign Citizen" and what it means. There's a large group of people around the world, actually, who are coalescing around this movement. It sounds like a worthy ideology, if it's true. Legally, however, I don't see much to stand on. But they are advertising all over the place how to accomplish this. I ask somebody who has tried this as soon as they get out of jail.



Crash Test Dummies

In 2018, 25 years afer the release of their multi-Grammy nominated hit album *God Shuffled His Feet*, The Crash Test Dummies hit the road for the first time in 20 years with an Anniversary Tour that spanned North America. The overwhelming reception led to a 30th Anniversary Tour in 2022 for their debut release *The Ghosts That Haunt Me* that touched down in the US, UK, Germany, Austria, the Netherlands, Luxembourg, and Canada. And the band is showing no signs of slowing down . . .

"Touring again was not something we'd planned on, but surprisingly – at least to me – there are lots of people who many years later, still want to come and hear us. The folks that are coming out to see these shows tell us their stories, some of them very funny, some very dark and all very personal. It's very humbling, being in the confidence of so many people" says lead singer-songwriter Brad Roberts, "and it has inspired us to continue to tour and make music."

Crash Test Dummies are a Canadian rock band from Winnipeg, Manitoba. The band is most identifiable through Brad Roberts (vocals, guitar) and his distinctive bass-baritone voice. The band members have fluctuated over the years, but its best known lineup consisted of Roberts, Ellen Reid (co-vocals, keyboards), Brad's brother Dan Roberts (bass guitar, backing vocals), Benjamin Darvill (harmonica, mandolin), and Mitch Dorge (drums, percussion).

The Cool Vibe of Greenwich Village

uring the late 60's and early 70's, Greenwich Village, an area of Manhattan, was a mecca for artists, musicians, poets, and free thinkers. There was a magic to that time period and that area. 

After a brief stint in Colorado Springs, he and wife Laurie are coming back home. He announced his retirement via social media as of January 1st of this year, while still keeping his famous sense of humor ("If people still think I'm still in the band, why should I tell them that I'm not"). Brevard Live had a chance to catch up with him and ask him 5 Questions...

After 31 years with the same band, Three Dog Night, you're retired. How does it feel?

PB: Um...'what do I do next?' That's kind of what I've been doing. I was recently watching one of our concerts on *YouTube*. I looked at it and said "who is that guy on drums?" That was like 25 years ago. All of a sudden, I'm old.

What spurred the decision to retire and come back home?

PB: I'm sick of riding on a bus. It gets so old. I can't sleep on them anymore. The typical schedule is: you play a show, get on the bus at midnight. Drive maybe 500 miles. They're nice busses and all, but you're bouncing up and down. Roads aren't what they used to be. It's amazing that they are this bad now. I don't sleep on the bus. 500 miles, you don't sleep. You get to the next city at 8 in the morning. Get to your room. Sleep. Get up and go to soundcheck. Play the show and do it all again the next day. The older you get, it's harder to do all that.



How did the band take the news and what is next for them?

PB: Well, Danny, who is one of the singers in the band, his son is the bass player. His other son is now the drummer. They both used to play in the band Sugar Ray. He's a good player and it is a good thing. He has been around and has been listening to the music since he was a kid. They already have 70 plus gigs booked for the upcoming year.

The band seems to have a real family vibe to it. Once a member, always a member, I would imagine?

PB: Oh yeah. Michael (Allsup), the guitar player, got off of the road a few years ago. We still include him on all of our group texts. He'll chime in with


some smart Alec comment and then we're off to the races!

Congrats to Pat and Laurie on the upcoming move! Look for Pat to be active in the local music scene!

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
JAMES' GANG

nakes, sharks, and spiders. Most • folks are deathly afraid of 'em. I have a deep respect for them, and our other native, other fauna. As far back as I can remember I've been exposed to snakes, sharks, etc. As a small child I was first exposed to them through my brother and father, later on by my more nature savvy-than-myself cousins in the swamps. Dad taught me SCUBA and both, he and my brother, taught me to use my eyes, ears, and olfactory sense while wading through the sea of grass, sloughs, and hammocks otherwise known as the Florida Everglades. We're rarely more than six feet from a spider in Florida but fear not. If you leave them alone they will leave you alone... Maybe. I've always said that Florida is the Australia of the United States and that we have many things here that want to either hurt you in defense or eat you out of hunger, usually it's just a defensive mechanism. Despite what many think, spiders do not want to interact with us. Like us they merely wish to survive. What I'm getting at is that it's not neccesary to squish or kill everything we don't understand completely. With one thousand seven hundred twenty eight new residents moving here every day I can't help but think that we are going to be seeing more folks encountering things that they fear resulting in injury or worse. Perhaps some sort of required orientation class for newcomers teaching a respect for our REAL inhabitants rather than fearing them might result in both the human and animal surviving the meeting.

That would make my Flori-Duh a more newcomer friendly environment.
