

## **Totally 80's Tour**

Big Country, Tommy Tutone Gene Loves Jezebel Bow Wow Wow

**Big Country** is one of Scotland's most iconic rock bands, known for their unique fusion of post-punk, new wave, and Scottish folk influences. Formed in 1981 in Dunfermline, Scotland, Big Country's distinctive blend of rock and Celtic influences quickly set them apart from their contemporaries. Their 1983 debut album, The Crossing, introduced hit singles like "In a Big Country" and "Fields of Fire," which became well known around the world. After the passing of their frontman Stuart Adamson in 2001, Big Country made the decision to carry on his musical legacy. The band consists of Tommy Paxton (lead vocals, lead guitar), Bruce Watson (guitar, backing vocals), Chris Stone (bass), Reece Dobbin (drums), and Jamie Watson (guitar, backing vocals).

Tommy Heath and Jim Keller founded the band **Tommy Tutone** in 1978 with Heath (lead vocalist/rhythm guitarist/ keyboards), Keller (lead guitar) and Terry Nails (bass/supporting vocals). Heath and Keller were the only constant members of Tommy Tutone during the band's heyday. In 2019, the band released their first studio album since 1998, *Beautiful Ending*. Of course, they'll play favorites including "867-5309/Jenny", "Baby It's Alright", "Which Man Are You', and more!

Gene Loves Jezebel are a British rock band formed in the early 1980s. Initially associated with gothic rock and post-punk, their 1983 debut album *Promise* reached #8 on the UK Indie Chart. Notable hits include "Desire(Come And Get It)", "The Motion Of Love," "Gorgeous."

# Firefall Pablo Cruise Pure Prairie League

The "The Yacht Rock Summer Tour" is an annual music tour that features bands known for their smooth, soft rock sound, often referred to as yacht rock. Launched in 2011, this tour takes place during the summer months and aims to transport audiences back to the late 1970s and early 1980s with iconic hits and nostalgic performances. The Yacht Rock Summer Tour 2025, featuring Firefall, Pablo Cruise, and Pure Prairie League, will kick off on Friday, July 18th, at the Peabody Auditorium in Daytona Beach. Next stop is at the King Center in Melbourne on Saturday, July 19th, 7:30 pm - both courtesy of Elko Concerts.

#### **REMEMBER THE BANDS?**

**Firefall.** Firefall is a soft rock band that formed in Boulder, Colorado, in 1974, when Rick Roberts desired a change of sorts in his musical endeavors after leaving *The Flying Burrito Brothers*. Eager to record and release a more defined and melodic music, he recruited guitarist Jock Bartley formerly of the band *Zephyr* and others. It should be noted that Jock is the multi talented guitarist that had replaced the legendary Tommy Bolin in Zephyr. Many of you will remember that Tommy filled the shoes of Ritchie Blackmore in Deep Purple and Joe Walsh of The James Gang.

The band's lineup was completed by members Mark Andes (formerly of the bands Spirit, and Jo Jo Gunne) and Larry Burnett. The group then took on the moniker 'Firefall'. Two years later the song "You are the woman soared up the Billboard charts finally peaking at # 9 followed by several more records and songs that proved to cement the band's place in pop rock history with the likes of 'Just remember I love you', and 'Strange way' both of which settled a single number shy of the top ten and peaking at #11. No small feat indeed.

The band has since gone through several changes in members yet retains original guitarist, vocalist Jock Bartley along with Sandy Ficca, Steven Weinmeister, Jim Waddel, and the newest addition in John Bisaha.

It should be noted that the band has a rich history with Florida as most of their catalog was recorded at the legend-

ary *Criteria Studios* in Miami and are truly what can be considered a Supergroup with various members over the years having collaborated or written and recorded music with The Byrds, Heart, Eric Clapton, Kenny Loggins, Stephen Stills, The BeeGees, and numerous other notable acts of the era.

In 2023 Firefall announced that their latest album, *Friends & Family*, would feature classic songs from other 1970s bands, including the Doobie Brothers, Heart, Fleetwood Mac, Loggins and Messina, the Band, Marshall Tucker Band and more. It was released on September 22nd.

50 years after their debut, founder Jock Bartley and the gang are still going strong, touring the world and bringing their music to the fans.

Pure Prairie League. From their beginnings in mid-Sixties Ohio as a group of friends playing cover tunes to the present-day unit featuring the propulsive team of drummer Scott Thompson and bassist Jared Camic, Keyboard Master Randy Harper, Guitar Ace/vocalist Jeff Zona and Pedal Steel/Saxophonist John Heinrich, PURE PRAIRIE LEAGUE continues to embellish the rich 50-plus year history of one of Country-Rock's pioneering forces. As one reviewer recently wrote: "PPL's sound combines sweet memories with edgy, contemporary muscle. Their vocals are as strong as Kentucky moonshine, and the musicianship and performance skills are as sharp as a straight razor".

Their eponymous first album - featuring the Norman Rockwell/Saturday Evening Post cover that introduced fans to PPL's trademark cowpoke "Sad Luke" - has been hailed as a "major early influence in the emerging popularity of Country-Rock music." Their second effort, the multi-platinum "Bustin' Out" brought us the Craig Fuller-penned classic "Amie", along with other gems of the genre. With "Two Lane Highway", nine more albums and countless shows, a legacy has been forged and enriched, highlighting contributions from several noteworthy members, including original co-founder George Ed Powell, Cincinnati's legendary Goshorn Brothers, Country Hall of Famers Gary Burr and Vince Gill, award-winning writer Jeff Wilson (3 Top-20 singles), top Nashville session vocalist Curtis Wright and a host of other guest appearances from Chet Atkins, Johnny Gimble, EmmyLou Harris, David Sanborn, Eagle Don Felder, Nicolette Larson, Rosemary Butler, Jenifer Wrinkle, Jeff (Birdman) Kirk, Mat Britain and many more.

Now in their sixth decade, Pure Prairie League continues to lead the way for the new generation of Country/Rockers such as Keith Urban, Nickel Creek, Wilco, Counting Crows and so many others that cite PPL as a major influence. Now, with the release of their new album "Back On Track" PPL brings it all back home with a dozen new songs that complete the circle begun in 1970 and continues to this day.

**Pablo Cruise.** Formed in 1973, Pablo Cruise released eight studio albums over a decade, during which time five singles reached the top 25 of the Billboard Hot 100. Known for their smooth blend of rock and pop, the band gained fame with hits like "Whatcha Gonna Do?" and "Love Will Find a Way," selling millions of records worldwide. Their music, characterized by honest, down-to-earth lyrics and infectious grooves, has earned them a loyal following.

Fast forward 20 years.... In 2005 a reunited Pablo Cruise picked up where they left off and today the band performs all over the U.S. and Canada and they're enjoying it more than ever... Since getting back together, they have released two live CDs and a DVD all through Sony Music documenting their exceptional live shows. During the Pandemic the boys wrote and produced a new single (through Sony) entitled "Breathe" which received considerable critical reviews! One of the great things about playing shows after all these years, is that primary songwriters David Jenkins and Cory Lerios are still on board! "Cory says, going out and playing shows these days, gives us the opportunity to not only pay tribute to our timeless repertoire, it also gives us a chance to see old friends and fans from back in the day, as well as gaining a whole new audience!" Today Pablo Cruise is bringing more energy and excitement to the stage than ever before, and with the addition of Larry Antonino (bass, vocals), Robbie Wyckoff (vocals, percussion) and Sergio Gonzalez (drums, percussion) the band has never sounded better!

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## The Column

#### Project Serpo

T'm sure you've all heard of Area 51, the top-secret airbase in Nevada where, after the crash of an alien aircraft, the several aliens that survived were taken. Several stories underground, the aliens were questioned and communicated through telepathy, so the stories go. What did we learn from them? What technology could be gleaned from the meetings? Where were they from? How did they get here? So many questions. What you probably have not heard of is another project that came about directly related to this meeting with the aliens. One of the surviving aliens was very forthcoming and wanted to set up a sort of alien exchange program with the people of Earth. To the Ebens, their thought patterns often relied on shapes and mental visualizations rather than words. 



## **My Flori-duh**

Gators, Snakes, and Bears...Oh My!

It seems that more and more folks are being attacked by our native fauna (critters that lived here long before we humans!). Some people just don't get it! DO NOT FEED WILD ANIMALS! All you're doing is condemning them to a certain demise and possibly yours. Remember, they were here first and if everyone would just follow some fundamental rules of engagement there might be less horror stories in the news.

Growing up during the sweltering hot and humid summer days in South Florida, us kids would swim any chance we got. It was the only escape from the oppressive heat. There was the old wooden bridge on the Tamiami Trail in Sweetwater. It's now an historical landmark and one of the rare places that Florida has deemed safe from certain destruction. The clear brown water under that old bridge was the coolest place to swim in the area. Gators were almost always near. To this day I know of nobody ever being attacked or killed by one. We were raised to respect the wildlife. That meant 'let the animals take their natural course, never feed an animal in it's natural habitat, never tease or molest an animal, never kill an animal unless it is to feed yourself or your family or you're in imminent danger.' In spite of their presence the water was always inviting and regardless of what some may consider hazardous we all gathered to swim and swing from the rope that hung from one of the tall and plentiful Australian pines lining the banks of the canal. Oh, there was more than just gators, there were snakes as well. They stayed away from us noisy kids, too.

That was Sweetwater, and although the population was sparse at the time, the Loop road where my family's bar was was almost uninhabited by comparison. We kids (all ten or eleven of us that lived there) would swim in the canal across that dusty gravel road where dozens of gators lounged on the banks enjoying the sunshine. My point is...If you make yourself a source of food for a wild animal, well, then you really do become a source of food and probably not in a pleasant fashion.

Snakes. Most folks have a seemingly natural aversion or even dislike of the elongated reptiles, but trust me, when I tell you that they fear you as much as you do them, even more. I've probably had as much interaction with snakes as most, and I hold them in high regard while respecting them. I've never been chased by a snake, and yet I've chased many. If you have been reading my stories for any length of time you know that as kids we caught venomous snakes to sell to the local herpetologists as a source of income. That's pretty much all I'm going to say about snakes this time. Maybe more in the future.

I once related an experience I had with a bear and her cubs to my father in law when he insisted that there are no bears in Florida. No matter what I said he was adamant that I was fabricating the story. I wasn't, and since then, my wife Lissa got to see a large black bear when we visited my old homestead.

Respect. Aretha Franklin didn't invent the concept but she certainly made

That doesn't include the multiple possessions of cassettes, videos, DVDs, and CDs.

Alas, Floyd is no more.

With the endless bickering between David Gilmour and Roger Waters, the passing of Richard Wright in 2008, along with other roadblocks, I am afraid my children will not experience the incredible productions, and spectacles the band always brought to town... Enter the tributes. There is The Australian Pink Floyd (whom Gilmour and Nick Mason endorsed) and many others. But as it can be with most bands, things change.

Brit Floyd was formed in Liverpool, England in 2011 by Damian Darlington who was in the Australian version before leaving the group. He thought he could better them with his new band. He was correct. The Brit Floyd show was spectacular! Although no one, nor anything could match the original, this is probably as close as it could get. With Pink Floyd it obviously started with the music and then the live shows, the lighting, the sound

(Floyd was the first band to ever tour and produce live shows with quadraphonic sound while utilizing their \*Azimuth co-ordinator). The band had always set the bar to extreme highs as far as live production goes, and Brit Floyd has done an incredible job of emulating it even if the scale is a bit smaller. Utilizing tremendous intelligent lighting, lasers, (way more than most larger acts do) and superior sound, the band tore through the pretty much all of the crowd favorites with total professionalism and class. Beginning the first set with the 'Pulse' video version of Learning to Fly and soaring into High Hopes followed by Goodbye Blue Sky, the band was at the top of their game. Enter *The Dogs of War* where the band brought a live dog on stage to traipse about during the song. The Great Gig in the Sky featuring Eva Avila performing Clair Torry's lofty non lyric solo on vocals was simply magnificent, and the video collage of composer keyboardist Richard Wright R.I.P. brought a nostalgic tear to both our eyes. ## Fred Migliore's FM Odyssey

t's an early afternoon on a Sunday in late March during WFIT's annual Spring Fund Drive. A radio station lobby looks more like a war room; volunteers are answering pledge phone calls. Fred Migliore, host of the syndicated show FM Odyssey, is sitting on a chair talking to well-wishers, like a star athlete after a game. His live show is done for the day, and the money raised during the Fund Drive will go a long way.

The station is WFIT, celebrating 50 years on air in 2025. For Migliore, 34 years (this past April) of that. He usually records his show, heard across the country, but comes in to do the 3 hour show for the twice a year fund drive. Migliore loves music. He needs music. And his weekly audience responds in kind. A dual resident of Brevard and New York, he flies back and forth, buying a one-way ticket each time. "I'll know when it's time to come back to Florida when I know," he explains.

He states that radio started going downhill in the 70s, and was even worse in FL. Nonetheless he dreamt of one day having his own radio show. "I remember being 10 years old, listening to Pete Fornatale reporting from Woodstock. (the experience would come full circle when he had him as a guest on the 40th Anniversary of Woodstock).

Migliore moved to Florida and Brevard in particular, in the 80s. He soon walked in the doors of WFIT, armed with a pitch for his own show called 'An Unconventional Sunday Morning' highlighting the music of the 70s. There was only one problem; they already had a successful jazz program on during his that time slot. WFIT did offer him a chance to help the DJ to get acclimated with the art form. When it was time for the DJ to leave, he recommended Migliore as his replacement. After a fly by the seat of his pants debut (complete with a chance meeting of now long time friend and colleague DJ Blair Clark), he was ready to fulfill his lifelong dream.

'An Unconventional Sunday Morning' was everything that Migliore hoped it would be. But it wasn't what the jazz show listeners were used to. "I used to get hate mail," he recalls. "People would mail the station letters and send emails." Over time, people warmed up and an audience was cultivated. "We started breaking fund drive records," he continues. "Eventually I contacted NPR about making the show accessible to other stations. I couldn't keep the name because there wasn't a guarantee they would air it on Sunday mornings." Thus, FM Odyssey was born.

As time went on, Migliore and his newly christened, syndicated show garnered more and more notable names. Judy Collins not only appeared on the show many times, but cohosted and came to WFIT for an in person taping. Jesse Collins Young became a personal friend, performing at the Gleason Center two times. Friendships blossomed that surpassed his wildest dreams. As life goes, so did heartbreak as Young passed away earlier this year. Migliore had spoken to him by phone a week before his death.

Migliore estimates that he has done over 400 interviews for the show over the years. He says he has contemplated writing a book about the show and his life, if only he had the time. "I've had a deadline to meet every week for the last thirty-four years," he says. "That's 1700 weeks of my life living on this schedule." Admittingly, he feels that this is his journey, his love/lust for the music. He is able to share this with his audience each week. He plans on continuing with the show 'until he dies'.

Migliore does consider himself, and the show as a historian or sorts for that period of music. "I feel that FM Odyssey helps preserve the American culture," he says. He produces the show each week in a home studio. He continues to be the highest raised fund drive show on WFIT. FMO has accounted for about 25 percent of the entire amount raised each fund drive. Listeners from all over the country call in during his time on the air to contribute and keep Public Media viable in a time where government officials have called for an end of funding.

Migliore takes frequent walks on the beach, barefoot (he hates shoes and normally walks around barefoot). As he contemplates the next 34 years, he boards a plane to go back to New York, return date unknown.




