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

Our annual party attracts hundreds of fans and industry insiders who typically come dressed to impress (frequently in limos) to celebrate the past year's worth of hard work, dedication and talent of area musicians and performers.

In addition to presenting awards, the 2012 BMAs also will offer an outstanding array of local musicians. We will announce our stellar line-up in our next issue. 

# Medusa

n Greek Mythology Medusa was a woman whose hair had been transformed into snakes. The mere attempt to look at her would turn anyone to stone. Fast forward a few thousands of years and Brevard County has the second coming of Medusa. But contrary to the original creature, this incarnation of Medusa is beautiful and enchanting. However, it will still turn you to rock - rock'n roll that is.

Even though Medusa is the name of the band that has entertained so many people for 15 years, a lot of fans associate the name with the front personality and vocalist. Brenda plays the role of Medusa well. Dressed in different costumes, somewhere between Gothic and sexy, she seems to be from a different world. Well, at least not from Brevard County. During the years she has changed appearance often and has become somewhat of a mystical lady herself.

What sets Brenda apart from many other rock vocalists is her ability to connect with her audience. She walks around the venue enabled by a wireless sound system that reaches 100 feet away. Among her fans she's in her element. She sings with them, sits on their lap, dances with them, in a nutshell: she's the life of the party. One of her trademarks is the whip that she carries. She has six of them and she uses it to point at people, tap them, caress them or even spank them a little, especially when it's someone's birthday. Brenda's performance is a major part of the whole show and people love it.

Did I mention that Brenda knows how to sing? She belts out the rock like a man. No Britney or Mariah here, this is Metallica, Nickelback and Van Halen in a short skirt. "I never tried to sound like Madonna or Cindi Lauper," she tells Brevard Live Magazine. "Not that I cannot appreciate their work. But I prefer the guy-bands." It wasn't until later that Brenda showed interest in a female voice. "I really liked Amy Winehouse," she tells us.

Looking back to Medusa's beginnings, the band was more of Gothic nature. The regular dance club performances didn't used to be their gigs. In 2000 Medusa released a self-titled CD with nothing but originals. But

during the years they mellowed out - somewhat. "The whip and the costume remained but the music are cover tunes that lead their way into clubs like Lou's Blues, Siggy's, Pineda Inn, and many others. People want to dance and Brenda dances with them.

"Sometimes we lose sight and need to locate her," laughs Fred Bolden, Medusa-drummer and co-founder. He and Brenda are the only original members of the band. But the other members have been around for a while: Darren Ebert, (guitar), Glenn Hess (keyboard), and Keith Roberson (bass). Guitar and bass player are also mingling with the audience. "Only I am stuck behind the drums," says Fred. "Sometimes I am the only one on stage."

The band has overcome some challenges over the years, and when Fred had both hips replaced in 2008, it was the wish to play again with his band that sped up his recovery. "We are great friends and love to perform together." That they all have great careers doesn't slow them down. They just might be one of the busiest bands in this county.

In 2006 their fans spoke loud and clear and voted Medusa to be Entertainer of the Year at the Brevard Live Music

Awards. The band is likewise dedicated to its fans. "Quite a few of them have become personal friends," says Brenda. Photos are being taken at many gigs and posted on the band's website. "It's like family", says Brenda.

Her fame is a blessing and burden at the same time. Being private in public has almost become impossible for Brenda. "That makes dating difficult," she tells us. "Not everyone enjoys the recognition all the time." But recently the Medusa-singer is happily involved in a new relationship with "somebody who can handle all the attention."

Any plans for the future? "We'll keep on going as long as we pack the venues," says Brenda. She's also exited about participating in a new project with other local musicians who want to record a song penned by musician Kenny Michaels who's been a staple in our music community. The proceeds of this recording is dedicated to fight children's hunger. "We're just in the beginning of this project but I am proud to be part of it," says Brenda.







# Atlanta Rhythm Section

For more than 30 years, members of The Atlanta Rhythm Section have entertained audiences all over the world with their hits. The members of Atlanta Rhythm Section originally came together as a session band at Studio One, an Atlanta area studio recording artists like Lynyrd Skynyrd, Al Kooper, Dickey Betts and .38 Special. The band put out 15 albums and were paired with contemporaries Lynyrd Skynyrd as the successors to the Allman Brothers – carrying the mantle of "Southern Rock" in the late 70s. But performing songs that were more musically diverse and having hits that had a softer, pop flavor, they had a sound all of their own. Influenced by music coming out of England and sharing the musical stylings of groups likes The Eagles and Fleetwood Mac, the members of ARS were accomplished musicians who constantly tried to evolve – think Steely Dan or Little Feat. With multiple gold and platinum albums to their credit, the band had two top 10 singles, "So Into You" and "Imaginary Lover", as well as Top 40 hits including "Doraville," "I'm Not Gonna Let It Bother Me Tonight," "Do It Or Die" and "Spooky".

The band underwent several member changes and tragedies during their decades of music. However, in the late spring of 2011, it was announced that singer Andy Anderson and bassist Justin Senker had graciously stepped aside to make way for the return of original members Rodney Justo and Paul Goddard. On August 20, 2011 they appeared at the Dothan Music Fest in Alabama and were joined on stage by original guitarist J.R. Cobb. Their former manager and producer, Buddy Buie, also put in an appearance at this show.

# Les Dudek

Les Dudek has been a well-known name in rock'n roll for decades. He started his career right here in Central Florida playing in highschool bands. Then Duane Allman died in a motorcycle accident leaving an empty spot in the Allman Brothers Band, Southern Rock's most popular band. Les Dudek decided to travel to Macon, Georgia, and offer his talent. He got the job. *Bothers And Sisters*, the Allman Brothers' most popular recording features Les Dudek along with Dickey Betts.

From there Les Dudek moved on as a guitarist for Boz Scaggs and The Steve Miller Band. He has toured and collaborated on albums with Cher (*Black Rose*, 1980), Stevie Nicks (*Rock A Little*, 1985), Dave Mason (*Old Crest On A New Wave*, 1980), Maria Muldaur (*Southern Winds*, 1978), Richard T. Bear (*Red*, *Hot and Blue*, 1978), Bobby Whitlock (*Rock Your Socks Off*, 1976), Dudek, Finnigan, Krueger Band (*self-titled album*, 1980), toured with Steppenwolf, and probably a few more.

Besides contributing his distinctive style to other recording artists, Les Dudek pursued his solo career. He signed with *Columbia Records* in 1975. He released four CDs with this label and two on his own, *E-Flat Production*.

# Larry Coryell

Throughout the seventies jazz guitarist Larry Coryell released album after album, often playing alongside the very best musicians of its time. Some of the heavy-weights include guitarists John McLaughlin, Eric Clapton, Jimi Hendrix, Paco De Lucia, Pat Metheny, Al Di Meola, John Abercrombie, Larry Carlton, and many, many more.

In 1979 and 1980 he toured Europe with Paco De Lucia and John McLaughlin as part of a guitar super-trio, eventually releasing a video recorded at the Royal Albert Hall, London, which commemorated this "meeting of the spirits." This trio was short lived, however, and he was replaced by Al Di Meola in early 1980.

Throughout the 80's, although playing almost exclusively acoustic guitar, Larry Coryell continued to break new ground. And if his ambitious avant-garde interpretations of Stravinsky and Ravel are any indication, it seems clear that there is much more to this guitar-slinging virtuoso from Texas than jazz - it's rock fusion.

Complicated? Perhaps, but his newest album, *Sketches of Coryell*, should simplify things. To quote Coryell himself, "The idea of this album was to *Shut Up'N Play Yer Guitar* in the immortal words of the dearly missed Frank Zappa. But I choose not to indulge in a lot of fast stuff. Instead we just concentrated on melody and whatever the composition called for." But whatever genre, whatever approach, with sixty recordings under his belt, Coryell can be considered a true "Guitar Legend."

# Mad for Mad Martigan

In the beginning there was a small tribe of horror and **▲** gamer themed rockers known across the land as Thomas Paine and the Founding Fathers. Life within the tribe was an ever illusive mix of familial anxiety and friendly rivalry. The dynamic amongst the elders of the tribe could at times be turbulent, but regardless of that T. Paine and TFF seemed to thrive and evolve for a time. At the end of the first rock era there was a falling out amongst the kinsmen and the tribe split. Soon other tribes were being formed, branching out from the remnants of the Founding Fathers. One such clan would come to be known as Serious Gorilla and would last only a short time longer than the rest of the offshoots. For a while it seemed the time of the tribes was over, and that the rock would no longer be. This was a time of darkness, a time of cover music, and open mics. Then a light through the clouds with a single beam shining down onto a single guitar cradled in the skillful hands of a single hero. Joined by two more adventurers, and then just one, and then two again, and then again only one, and then again two - at last the trio was complete. A new tribe was born, the tribe of Mad Martigan, and the time of rock had come once more.

I called Jason Anz around noon to talk about his latest project with Eric Nyman and Cory Barber. After a number of band combinations, mostly in the rhythm section, they seem to have finally found the right mix and are making a splash in the local pond. Mad Martigan is a power trio in every sense of the word - crunch heavy riffs, solid thumping bass lines and Peart like rhythms. The band takes its name from Val Kilmer's marauding character in the 1988

Lucas/Howard fantasy film Willow. In the movie Martigan is a hard hitting, dashing macho man with a heart of gold. The name fits the band well.

### Can you tell us a little bit about how Mad Martigan came to be?

JA: About a year ago I got together with Eric and we started kicking some stuff around. We decided to put a band together and enlisted Akila Rhone on drums. She lasted about two months and then we found Steven Hall. Steven didn't stick either and we were losing hope when we came across Cory Barber, our current drummer, and he was the guy. Everything just clicked and here we are.

# You are one of the few bands in the area playing original music exclusively. Was that a conscious decision from the beginning?

JA: Not really, but so far that's all we really want to play. We don't have anything against covers, but every time we talk about doing one the conversation lasts about five minutes and then we decide against it. There are some great bands around here writing really good stuff and we want to be a part of that.

# Do you think there is deficiency in our area when it comes to noticing original music?

JA: Most definitely. We try not to think in terms of pushing just our band. We try to think of it as a group effort to get everyone out there, ALL the great bands in this area.

#### Tell about the song writing process in MM.

JA: I write most of the songs, but of course, things change some when the guys get a hold of them. Usually I'll think of a melody and record it. Sometimes I write down all the lyrics right off, but most of the time I'll play the melody over and over singing gibberish until something comes out.

# That's very much the way Phil Collins writes his music.

JA: Funny you should say that, because his writing style is one of my main inspirations.

#### What inspires the content of your songs?

JA: Uh... everything. Sometimes it's a personal situation, and sometimes it's about a super hero that has the ability to punch non-material spirits.

### Like your song Ghost Puncher?

JA: Exactly.

# You and Eric both have families. How supportive, or not, are your families?

JA: I can't speak for Eric, but my fiancé has always been very supportive, and my 6 year old daughter loves our music. As a matter of fact her favorite song is one she fortunately doesn't know the words to called "One Night Stand."

### Where do you see this band in a year? In five years?

JA: A year ago I would have said I wanted to have our album completed and be gigging steadily, but with our revolving drummer situation things have taken a little longer than I liked. So now I'll say, by next year I want to have the album completed and be gigging steadily. In five years? That's really hard to say. I really just want to be making music that people enjoy listening to, and I hope I'll still be playing with these guys. I enjoy playing with them more than any other band I've played with.

# Do you care about being a rock star at all, or is it just about playing?

JA: My favorite place in the world is on stage, but as long as I'm making music and people are listening, that's all I really care about. And again I want people to listen to everyone, not just us. There is a lot of talent here that goes overlooked and that's sad. If I could tell everyone out there one thing to remember it would be to support local, original music in all its forms.

# Caucus Suckers (Part III)

et me start off this month by trying to elucidate, basically, on this whole delegate process and why it will be important this year. If you watch CNN, FOX, MSNBC, or any other TV "news" show, they show the Caucuses and primaries as big party type, flag waving, speech giving, yee haa yelling events in which the person who wins gets the delegates from that particular state. Well, it doesn't exactly work like that.

Delegates are elected on a local, then district, then state level, then eventually on to the national level. In other words, at the caucuses, delegates to the county convention are elected, at the county convention state delegates are elected, and at the state convention national delegates are elected. For the most part, once a candidate has an insurmountable lead, the rest of the candidates drop out and back the party leader, that is, until now. Ron Paul asks the question, "What if I don't drop out?".

You see, in theory, once you win a state caucus or primary, you get the delegates or a portion thereof, of the allocated delegates. Some states have "proportional" delegate seating based on the amount of votes you receive, and some states you get all the delegates if you win the election. The thing is, the delegates have yet to be "seated" since they haven't been elected yet. That's the next step. Here's where it gets even more confusing. Delegates for a certain candidate are then elected at the conventions mentioned above. So, even if you win the popular vote, it is still possible to lose in the delegate count if your opponent has more followers in the delegate voting. Ahhh...once again, our democracy at work.

To vote for delegates, you merely have to be a registered voter. Some states require that you have to be registered in the party, some don't. For the most part, you don't have to know a candidate's name, what he stands for or anything in order to vote. In the Romney case, this is readily apparent. The Ron Paul camp, on the other hand, consists of many who are highly educated as to the rules, issues and policies of their candidate. As such, the turn-

out for the delegate election for Ron Paul has been huge. The results are a much higher delegate count for Ron Paul than anyone imagined.

Breaking News: As I'm sitting here writing this, Ron Paul announces that he will quit campaigning in the remaining states that haven't voted yet, but will continue to rack up delegates. What a coincidence!

OK, you're still awake? So, as of today, Ron Paul leads the delegate count in Alaska, Minnesota, Virginia, Nevada, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Oklahoma, Maine, Louisiana, and Arizona. In some cases, things got ugly. In Arizona for example, convention leaders tried all kinds of things to confuse people, including ballot stuffing, and two Paul delegates being physically assaulted. This whole scenario has the Republican establishment freaking out! Here's the actual delegate count right now:

Romney 875, Paul 439, Santorum 233, Gingrich 92. Since Santorum and Gingrich dropped out, their delegates are up for grabs. Interestingly, Santorum is trying to persuade his delegates to go with Paul! In an open letter, Santorum's county caucus organizer says: "We need principled fighters and not a pretty boy in a suit. We nominate Romney and it's the equivalent of making him the starting quarterback because he simply looks good in the uniform. He's a defensive coordinator's dream. The mere fact he wins in the same places liberals do in the general election says a lot."

What would be the impetus for Ron Paul to keep collecting delegates? Well, so far he has enough to have a seat at the national convention where he will likely get a chance to speak and, more importantly, to influence the mainstream GOP agenda. You must also keep in mind that his son is now a Senator who may be looking at his own presidential run down the line somewhere. So keep an eye on the National Convention in Tampa coming up in August. It should be a doozy!



Jeff Daughtridge (Blame the Tyrant): In general, for people to realize how important it is to come to local shows, whether it be original acts, cover acts, or national acts coming through, keeping current venues, bands, and live music entertainment alive. More avenues of promotion are always a good idea. How about a cable access channel that tells what bands are playing where, no matter what band or where they are playing. Lastly, supporting local music stores is very important. Musicians need their gear. Local shops promote the shows and talk directly with local musicians.

Robert Curtis Davis (Classic Country band): We DES-PERATELY need more SPEEDY BRUTALITY from Space Coast booking agents. Agents officially listed as focal booking contacts for the venues who will QUICKLY respond and say truthfully, "YOUR act does not stand a PRAYER of a chance of being booked by me! So DON'T waste your time sending me FIFTEEN more emails/voicemails that I fully intend to COMPLETELY IGNORE! So, MOVE ON, Sucker!"

Justin Purser: Move Coachella to Erna Nixon Park.

**Sam Hain** (Best Supporting Actor/Jimbo & the Noshows/ The Reversals): Another venue like the Metro, less Mustang Sally, more cowbell!

**Lissa Galindo** (Rock Star Karaoke): Brevard County needs a new bar/live music venue geared towards spotlighting all local bands DONE RIGHT with awesome stage, PA, lighting, etc ... It has been tried before but was never successful due to other factors outside the music world.

#### Lee Entertainment:

- 1. Better pay from the venues
- 2. More diversity in what is being booked
- 3. More of an alliance/partnership between the clubs, bands & agents

**David Alan Zigmont** (comedian): I don't even think it has to go that far. Granted it would be nice to have a spot to just "plug and play," but what I think the real deal is, is getting a venue to just go all in on a local entertainment night. (I say that because I'm a comic, not in a band). Most places simply try it for a week, maybe two, and toss it away when it doesn't pull the kind of business they expect. Truth is, it takes a while to build up ANY night, whether it's Ladies Night, 2-4-1 night, or a local showcase night. Couple that with a majority of people shrugging off something they

have never heard before and you get a daunting task in front of you. If there was a single place that would go all in on a night, like that willing to take the hit the first couple times to build the crowd, then I really think the rest of the area might follow suit and things might turn towards the positive. So much talent in the area and the biggest problem is lack of outlets. Just my opinion.

**Luzviminda Dela Paz** (music writer/music fan): Make it easier and be inviting to an audience to attend local shows. Have more all ages events.

- Help with promotion. Have merch available or free swag which helps to advertise local talent and future shows. Street teams put the word out. Publicity = audience.
- Local musical festivals.. exposes new music to potential fans
- · Open mics.
- Better venues that will attract talents on tour, but also keep loyal to local music. Support the venues that support live music and help the scene thrive.
- Join forces. Local music with art. Collaborative efforts with local organizations, charities and fundraiser events. Mix it up!
- Lastly, give me music to review.

**Steven Lillie** (ex United Divided): I think my wishes are pretty generic; bigger venues, bigger bands and bigger crowds.

Joe Barrera (The Day After): My three wishes for Brevard's local music scene; 1) MORE VENUES!!! 2) More venues for full bands/original acts. 3) More awesome columnists like Steve Keller who loves, lives and is a big part of Brevard's local music scene! Love ya bro!!

**Jason Chesser** (guitarist/fan): More chances for guitarists like myself with little band experience to get noticed. Anyone looking for a guitarist now?

**Nick Matarazzo** (Forever Silly Beans): I wish that more traveling bands and touring artists make it to some of our smaller and up-and-coming venues in the greater Brevard Area. Some excellent opportunity for some amazing shows, and local bands that have great talent can perform as opening acts for the shows.

**Shain Honkonen** (Vilifi): People/ Venues need to strive to be more open to different types of music. We've all heard the same things for a long time, many of those who are striving to get their music heard are not offered gigs because they don't play Mustang Sally. I also think managers should hold a higher standard and realize that it pays to hire

a professional and dedicated musician/ group rather than whoever is cheapest.

**Steven Poe** (Law of Poe): I agree with Shain but with one addition. The people who do recognize the need for original music will never appreciate it for what it is when they find it. As *Forgotten Citizen* it took over 3 years for anyone to even take me seriously and give me a gig even though nothing else in Brevard (maybe even Florida) sounds anything like FC.

I spent hours and hours of time in a hot, constricting suit, giving out free download cards which damn near NOBODY redeemed. By the time things finally started to pick up a little bit, the frustration and disappointment with people's apathy ended up being the death of FC.

Brevard's music scene will continue to consist of ubiquitous tribute bands and cover bands if people ignore the original music that Brevard does have to offer. Melbourne venues are the worst offenders. They'll take your demo or business card and swear up and down that they'll call you and then they never do. They just keep booking the same damn bands or musicians over and over again and wonder why people don't come there for music.

Richard Beyer: There is a host of talented players in Brevard County. Let's hope the establishment owners appreciate this and do not just take it for granted! I play covers and always have, but I play my style of guitar. With that said Jeremiah Ellsworth has four CDs of nothing but originals up on Reverb Nation and back in 2000 hit the top of the MP3.com charts and sent dozens of CDs world wide to radio stations in Brazil, Germany, France, Canada and college stations in the US by request to play the tune "Branded" with Stan Soloko on drums, Mark Hovis on Bongos, Mike Carpenter on bass and keys and me on guitar and vocals. I can slip my stuff onto love cover shows or I have enough material to cover any four hour gig with another sixty tunes written and ready to record. I play to play! And hope to find players who will connect from the internal love of the moment even if it is Mustang Sally.

If you want to play nothing but originals you need to be ready to do it for free at these bars or work them into the sets and push your CDs at the breaks.

Plus, the facility has NO in-house staff. In short, I'd be free to "do my thing" at Front Street without the usual scrutiny of hotel and banquet managers.

I became further ramped up about the wedding when I first met with the bride-to-be at Starbucks for the ol'itinerary planning pow-wow a few weeks prior to the big day. Jennifer was prompt, prepared and as "calm" as a seasoned pro (see tip "A" above).

Jennifer and groom-to-be, Pat planned to utilize Front Street's beautiful gazebo area, which provides the perfect setting for outdoor ceremonies. Although they opted for outdoors, the ceremony easily and quickly could have been moved indoors had weather conditions become less than ideal (see tip "C" above).

Typically, Front Street provides ample parking space.

However, Jennifer and Pat's gala just happened to coincide with Downtown Melbourne's Spring Arts Festival. This event runs from morning 'til night and attracts an estimated 60,000 people -- 60,000 people with limited parking options. Front Street is located only about fourteen inches from downtown and its parking lot became desirable real estate for art show enthusiasts. As a result, even I had to heed my own advice (see tip "A" above) when I had difficulty navigating through traffic onto Front Street property and locating a spot. But whadaya know? In the end, one way or another, all of Jennifer and Pat's guests succeeded in ultimately arriving at the desired destination.

I've never seen the inside of Front Street look as absolutely stunning as it did when I arrived to set-up for this wedding. And I must give mad props to Tenting by Ken and Linda Davis at Petals Flowers and Gift Shops in Melbourne for helping to transform the local reception hall into an upscale, wedding-type fantasyland.

The Bridesmaids, Groomsmen, Maid of Honor and Best Man, ALL looked impeccable -- so did the 150-plus guests. In fact, from military guys and hipster dudes to fabulous fashionistas and bubbly beach bunnies, pretty people were seemingly EVERYWHERE at this party! (Uh, talk about being the odd man out.) Heck, I was feeling so inadequate being surrounded by such a stellar-looking group, that if I could have effectively done the gig from under the table or wearing a paper sack over my head, I certainly would have.

Meeting the needs of a gathering this size would require a cracker-jack catering outfit and the staff at A Chef's Touch rose to the occasion. The spread looked incredible, smelled amazing, and judging by the mountain-like platefuls I saw coming from the buffet line, I'd wager a guess that the food was equally delicious!

And while I'm on the subject of top-notch professionals, I want to mention Martina Tannery from Martina's Photography. The proper chemistry between photographer and DJ is essential in the success of a wedding event. Martina is one of the best and I'm eager to work with her again.

I've often referred to the cake as the "crowning jewel" of any wedding reception. And Jennifer and Pat's cake bedazzled guests with diamond-like splendor. In short, the creation from Sue Ann's Bakery in Indialantic looked just too beautiful to slice.



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


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### Fly-Fishing

Fly-fishing is a sport in which the fisherman uses a lure, disguised as a small invertebrate, to catch fish. This can be done in both fresh and salt water. Although this is method is mainly used for catching trout and salmon, it can also be used for catching bass, carp, and much more.

The history of fly-fishing can be traced back to the Roman Claudius Aelianus around the 2nd century. Typically fly-fishing equipment does not vary too much from the traditional art of fishing. The fly-fishing enthusiast can be found equipped with a rod, "flies," and a reel adapted for fly-fishing.

One local fly fisherman, Bill Potter, enjoys every one of the many aspects of fly-fishing. Bill Potter claims he has been hooked on fly-fishing ever since he went to an island in the Pacific with his friends to do some fly-fishing. Potter enjoys fly-fishing in Florida, however he mostly fishes in Montana. "I like the solitude and the scenic places that are associated with fly-fishing," says Potter.

One popular fly-fishing location in our area is called the Mosquito Lagoon. This location offers the opportunity to catch red fish, trout, and snook. Many fly-fisherman find that the mangroves, which can be found in the Mosquito Lagoon, are the ideal place around here for fly-fishing.

Another fly fisherman, Christopher Tanis, enjoys flyfishing because it's his own "time out from the world." Tanis claims fly-fishing is a more "extreme" way to catch fish. Tanis compares fly-fishing to using a whip and whipping the line further and further until it settles on the water. "I like fly-fishing because there are never too many people around you and it involves a great deal of waiting," says Tanis. Tanis currently works in a local bait and tackle shop called "Black Dog Bait and Tackle."

Another local enthusiast, Richard Goode, enjoys all of the challenges and rewards associated with fly-fishing. "I like the challenge of learning the technique and having to tie your own lures," says Goode.



Out of all the difficulties associated with fly-fishing Goode believes the conditions are most challenging. "The windy and turbulent conditions can make it very difficult to use the technique properly," says Goode.

One national charity called "Casting for Recovery," offers the opportunity to fly fish for local breast cancer survivors. This charity offers an all expenses paid for fly-fishing trip and selects their attendees by lottery.

One woman, Barbara Arthur, was given the privilege to go on this trip. "My favorite part of this trip was learning how to fly-fish," says Arthur. Arthur currently owns the "Honest John's Fish Camp" which offers "casual boating, fishing, and sightseeing in a pristine setting."

# The Ballad of Mr. Pigeon

Most people in American society think of pigeons as dirty animals. I've quite often heard them referred to as "rats with wings." It's true, they live inside the borders of metropolitan communities. And it's also true that they thrive on the scraps of food we so readily waste. But to peg them as filthy, disease ridden animals not worthy of our respect couldn't be a bigger mistake. I know this because I recently rescued an injured pigeon from being ran over by a herd of stampeding casually oblivious drivers at a major intersection. I took the bird home to care for it in safety and with the help of the internet became an instant expert on the breed of dove with commonly know as pigeon. That's right, I said dove.

As it turns out all breeds of pigeons are descended from doves originally domesticated by the ancient Romans who kept them as valued pets. The original doves lived in crevices on the sides of cliffs and than later in rocky alcove habitats created for them by their Roman advocates. Through a series of events the doves eventually escaped and spread across the globe evolving over time into the many different breeds we have today.

Because of their history of rocky condo living, pigeons typically live and thrive in metropolitan areas in and around buildings and overpasses, or man made-cliffs. They spend much of their time around bustling traffic and crowds of people, making them one of the least skittish birds around. They are scavengers and eat opportunistically to survive. Because of this they have developed a fairly high functioning immune system; unfortunately this practice has also contributed to the pigeon's reputation as a dirty bird. But when you take all of this into consideration it paints a picture of a very hardy, adaptable animal. Add to that the fact that they were domesticated before they were wild, leaving them all semi-tame, and you have the makings of pretty cool bird.

Technically you are not supposed to care for wild animals on your own, you should take them to a wildlife sanctuary and let the experts do their thing, but we decided to keep Mr. Pigeon (that's what we named him) for a few days and see if we could help him. Upon closer inspection Mr. Pigeon is a very handsome boy, with different shades of grey striping his body with a lighter underbelly and a streak of blue under his wings. His wings seemed to be fine and he could stretch them out without any perceived pain, but what we did notice were a couple of small growths around one of his eyes and on the side of his face near



his beak. Much web research and numerous pictures told us that he most likely is suffering from a common virus known as pigeon pox. Pigeon pox usually isn't fatal, unless complications occur like respiratory infection, and it only lasts a few weeks, but it is very contagious and birds that are sick with pox should be kept away from other birds possibly for the rest of their lives as they may become permanent carriers. The growths, although horrible and scary looking, should dry up and fall off when the virus has run its natural course. As a matter of fact, birds who survive tend to have a very strong immune system as a result and don't usually get sick again.

Checking around with the local shelters I discovered that if even once he is better he may not be able to fly and if that's the case the usual policy is to euthanize. I understand the reasoning behind it, the bird would have to be caged for the rest of its life and never allowed back into the wild again, but I couldn't take that chance and we decided to keep him and try to nurse him back to health. If, when he is better, he can fly - great! Off into the wild blue yonder, but if he cannot fly then we will happily give him a comfortable, loving home and welcome him into the family.

At the time I'm writing this it has been almost a week since I rescued Mr. Pigeon, and in the last few days his spirits seem to be up and he has become much more active. I still Janet daily not to get too attached, because while he is sick there is always the chance that he won't make it, but for the moments things are looking good and it's nice to have another life in the house.

From day one Mr. Pigeon has been nothing but friendly and cooperative with us. I can pick him up and hold him without too much fuss, and when I take him outside for fresh air he stays right near me. Everything I've read about pigeons tells me that they easily and quite successfully adapt to in-house living and make wonderful pets. So far that seems to be true. I don't know yet what will happen with Mr. Pigeon, but I do know that for the time being he is safe and alive- and that's at least better than his chances in the middle of a busy intersection. Check back next month for an update on Mr. Pigeon's progress.


