





Brevard's Original Music Scene

oney Miller has been a musical enigma on the Space Coast since 2010. The band is a group of musicians playing original music written by David Miller who, by his own claim, is not a musician or even a decent guitar player. "I have never been serious about playing guitar," laughs David in an interview with Brevard Live Magazine, "or I would be better at it." So what is it that attracts talented musicians to play with his band? Why has Honey Miller become a household name in our area? And most astonishingly, how come that this band that produces original music is so widely accepted in places that only feature cover bands. The answer to all these questions is David Miller himself, who is as unusual yet simple as the music he produces and the band mates he keeps.

Meet David Miller! At first glance he presents himself rather aloof, maybe a bit withdrawn which might be perceived by some folks as an attitude. He's not cheery or sad, not involved or bored, and after a while you might realize that "Anywave Dave" - that's his nickname - is more of an observer than a participant. Someone who takes assessment of the things around him, not only to make sense but find out how he can make them work for him. No matter if it is a wave to ride or a tune to play, Dave will figure out how he gets the most out of either by absorbing its energy and working with it. He's actually not detached at all. "No, I'm not an American Indian," says Dave getting ahead of the question. "People ask me that a lot."

Born in New York, Dave did not have an easy upbringing. "I had to figure it out myself, there wasn't a lot of guid-

ance," says Dave, and you can tell that this is not a comfortable subject. With 17 he joined the army, "which I left a little early." From there to college in Ohio, followed by a move to Florida where he finished his education. Then he enrolled in life; got married with son, and what do you do when you live in Florida, are young and want to make a quick independent buck? Right - landscaping! David did that for a while, and yes, "it was hard work."

It all came to a screeching halt with a near death accident when he was 30 years old. While recovering physically, he discovered his mental capacities. "I had time to think about the things I experienced while doing them," remembers Dave. And then - he had ideas, solutions. After analyzing certain procedures of landscaping he came up with the concept of a "Trash Pan." Google it and you find out that it is offered by Lowes, Amazon, and on www.incredible-solutionsinc.com, all with high customer ratings. Indeed, Dave Miller is an inventor with several more projects in the works. "I look at the world and put things together that should be together. I am more of a re-inventor," he laughs. "It's about creating something for the world."

Just having a great idea isn't cutting it anymore. It needs to be financed, protected, sponsored, promoted - a process that is time and nerve consuming and might stop others in their tracks. A few lawsuits later, Dave knows what he's doing and makes it work for him. By the way, it took about \$1 Million investment before Trash Pan was in the stores, and Dave orchestrated the project.

Now apply this concept to music. The observation of life on the Space Coast, the sound of the ocean, the bustling tourism. Now try to translate this into melody and poetry with simple chords. Put notes together that should be together, re-invent the music, and - voila! - the sound of Honey Miller was born, another creative outlet for Dave. He wrote his first song in 2002, rather spontaneously. "I don't write music with total intent. If it doesn't work out - fuck it." - Next wave!

He started out as solo acoustic act, playing small stages around Cocoa Beach. Then Dave began (sometimes accidentally, sometimes with intent) to add musicians and pile up new material. This evolution resulted in a grouplead singer/songwriter trio David Miller, Marvin Parish and Anna Lusk.

The last four years Honey Miller has performed at hundreds of shows, ranging from art and music festivals to surf contests - from museum exhibits to dive bars, and everything in between. Honey Miller was nominated for *Brevard Live Magazine*'s 2011 "Favorite Original Band", and were finalists for *Brevard Live/Lou's Blues* "2012 Original Music Series". The prior band completed recording and releasing a live thematic recording in 2012 and have opened for Sonny Landreth and Marcia Ball at Ponte Vedra Concert Hall. Their music has been used on multiple documentaries

and videos. Honey Miller music is currently on iTunes and available in several retail outlets within and outside Brevard County. After years of band change ups and increasing the creative bell curve, a full length album, *Among The Boxes*, has been released and celebrated with two sold out CD release concerts on April 26th and 27th at The King Center's Studio Theater.

So where is Dave Miller, the band, going from here? "We won't be doing a lot of club gigs anymore," answers Dave. "You will find the band at special events or festivals."

David is currently in the process to submit his music, especially the song "One Face, One Human Race". In the past week he's made contact with a Russian born photographer, living in Australia, who is capturing the faces of indigenous peoples throughout the world. They haven't signed any agreements but are working towards collaborating on a video together. "It's a very interesting project of his that goes hand-in-hand with what we are doing. Trying to do this organically as always," says Dave.

What else is "Anywave" Dave into? He started surfing at age 36, "after my divorce." Ever since he's been an avid surfer and become not just good but also very involved in it. Dave was a big part of creating the surf museum at Ron Jon's. Dave has the recipe for success, he's relentless and orchestrates projects to its very limits. And if something doesn't work out? "There is always another wave to catch," says Dave. Really ANY? He laughs: "Any wave that won't kill me." - Got any doubt that his music will make it?



YNGWIE MALMSTEEN

Yngwie Johan Malmsteen is a Swedish guitarist and bandleader. Malmsteen first became known in the 1980s for his neoclassical metal playing style in heavy metal. In 2009, *Time* magazine rated Malmsteen as among the 10 greatest electric guitar players of all time.

Seven-year-old Yngwie watched in awe as Hendrix blasted the audience with torrents of feedback and sacrificed his guitar in flames. The day Jimi Hendrix died, the guitar-playing Yngwie was born. As a teenager he was heavily influenced by classical music, particularly 19th century violinist composer Niccolò Paganini, and also discovered his most

important guitar influence, Ritchie Blackmore. He also cites Uli Jon Roth and Brian May as significant influences. In early 1982 (at the age of 18), Mike Varney of Shrapnel Records, who had heard a demo tape of Malmsteen's playing from the 1978 titled Demo Powerhouse, brought Malmsteen to the United States. He played briefly with Steeler on part of their 1983 selftitled album, then appeared with Graham Bonnet in the band Alcatrazz, their 1983 debut No Parole from Rock 'n' Roll, and the 1984 live album. Live Sentence. In 1984. Malmsteen released his first solo album Rising Force, which featured Barrie Barlow of Jethro Tull on

drums and keyboard player Johansson. Rising Force won the Guitar Player Magazine's award for Best Rock Album and was nominated for a Grammy for 'Best Rock Instrumental', reaching no. 60 on the Billboard album chart. In late 1988, Malmsteen's signature Fender Stratocaster guitar was released, making him and Eric Clapton the first artists to be honored by Fender.

Yngwie Malmsteen's career has spanned over 40 years with over twenty albums to his name. He is currently on the *World Of Fire* Tour with a stop at The King Center. Tickets starting at \$47. Call 321-242-2219 or *kingcenter.com*

Mark Chesnutt

Every year the Space Coast State Fair features a stage with music and a concert with a national artist. This year it is a honky-tonk night with no other than country artist Mark Chesnutt. All concerts are free with fair admission. For VIP tickets go to eventbrite.com.


Mark Chesnutt is one of Country's true musical treasures. Critics have hailed him as a classic Country singer of the first order and some of Country music's most elite entertainers, from George Jones to George Strait, echo the sentiment. He has 14 No. 1 hits, 23 top ten singles, four platinum albums and five gold records to his credit; he maintains a front-and-center presence with a hefty tour schedule year after year.

In a creative forum that sometimes confuses style with substance, Mark Chesnutt possesses both. Remaining true to himself as a traditional country artist, while keeping the pace with the ever-changing country recording landscape, Mark Chesnutt has a knack for picking great songs, delivering them with world-class style and a heart-felt emotion that's lived-in.

Chesnutt got his start in the honky-tonks of Beaumont, Texas, learning from his father, Bob Chesnutt, a singer, record collector and major fan of classic country music. Playing alongside his dad, Mark embraced his father's influence one set at a time and to begin making a name for himself. Mark sang covers by Lefty, Merle, George and Waylon to develop his unmatched crowd- pleasing rapport and his authentic country style.


Bob Chesnutt often traveled to Nashville to record and to broaden his exposure. He began taking Mark along to record when he was just 17. After nearly a decade of recording on regional labels, word got out about this young country vocalist. *Music Row* executives came to hear Mark on his own Texas turf and recognized the depth of Mark Chesnutt's raw talent. In 1989, he was signed to MCA Nashville and his list of accolades tells the rest of his story. With the release of his first single "Too Cold At Home," Mark established himself as one of country's authentic and talented vocalists. He won the CMA Horizon Award attracting the attention of country legend George Jones who introduced him as "A boy from Beaumont, Texas who is the real deal."

That recognition and initial success opened the door to offer Mark his chance of a lifetime, to do what he loved most - sing country music for country fans; this time, on a national level. "The first couple years it was non-stop."



Mark says. His dedication paid off. He developed a true blue fan base. "Fans," he confides, "are the reason for my success." His fans helped his records to climb the charts one right after the other making him one of Billboard's Ten Most-Played Radio Artists of the 90's. Mark's singles were some the decade's most memorable; from the fun tempo "Bubba Shot The Jukebox" to emotional ballad "I'll Think Of Something." Mark is easily identified for his string of hits including "Brother Jukebox," "Blame It On Texas," "Old Flames Have New Names," "Old Country," "It Sure Is Monday," "Almost Goodbye," "I Just Wanted You To Know," "Going Through The Big D," "It's A Little Too Late," "Gonna Get A Life," and one of his biggest, "I Don't Want To Miss A Thing," a song that held its position at the top of the charts for four consecutive weeks.

Of all the recorded highlights Chesnutt has enjoyed, they take a back seat to his first love; Mark Chesnutt lives to perform on stage. "I just make records because I want people to come see my show," he says. "Recording music for folks to just listen to music is great but I've got to be out there on stage making it." Mark has been on the road since 1990. Whether you hear Mark Chesnutt with a new release on the radio, or see his face on the cover of a new CD, folks can always find Mark doing what he was born to do playing. "The clubs and honky tonks are home for me; it's comfortable and I'm always with friends," says Chesnutt.





Get MIFF-ed!

he 19th annual Melbourne Independent Filmmakers Festival, set for October 20th and 21st at the Premiere Theaters Oaks 10, has announced its film selections for 2017 and a special guest, Brian O'Halloran, star of the ground-breaking indie hit Clerks. He'll be honored with the Indie Pioneer Award, and festival-goers will be able to see the new behind-the-scenes documentary Shooting Clerks. Another special guest is homegrown professional comedian Frankie Paul who will host and emcee for the comedy film program on Friday night. The MIFF has an interesting history and Brevard Live was fortunate to speak with one of the founders about it. Dr. Terry Cronin is one of the "3 Boys Productions" team who created this yearly event that put Brevard County on the map for independent film makers all over the world.

Together with two friends - that's 3 Boys Productions - Terry Cronin produced a film called *Under the Bridge* about a series of murders under the Melbourne causeway and entered it in several film festivals. Prior to that, the guys had thought that all film festivals were glamorous events a la Cannes and Sundance. "The majority of the festivals were far less than glamorous, some were in bars that had pinned a sheet up on a wall as the projection screen," says Terry. "We were a little disappointed and thought, why can't we put together a film fest in Mel-

bourne and make it a classy event with all the glamour and glitz of the aforementioned festivals, and have it benefit a worthwhile charity?" And in 1999 the MIFF was born.

The first year it was a one day affair held at the Henegar Center downtown. It was a great success, people dressed up for the occasion. The glamour was real. "Soon after, Premiere Theaters' owner Robert Kurrus offered us the use of the Oaks 10 facilities, and we entered the digital age," remembers Terry. Mr. Kurrus tragically passed away in an airplane crash in 2012, however, the Premiere Theaters Oaks 10 has continued to host the event in their beautiful facility ever since.

What began as a one night event has blossomed into a world renowned film festival that gets entries from many different countries as well as spotlighting local filmmakers and their work. Every year the festival adopts a specific theme and this year's is *New York New York*.

Terry explains: "There are several reasons why we went with this theme, one is Thursday night we are showing a film titled Women Who Kill. The film is fast gaining a huge following while amassing a lot of awards on a national level. The movie was filmed in New York by New York resident Ingrid Jungermann. The kicker is, Ms. Jungermann was raised in Palm Bay so it actually represents the Big Apple and peripherally Brevard." Flying Pizza

 Γ irstly, I hope everybody made it through hurricane Irma ok. I realize it has been a very trying time for many. For me, it was relatively painless. I had electricity, phone and internet throughout the whole ordeal, give or take a couple of hours. Of course, all my gigs were cancelled so being out of work was the worst thing I had to deal with. This did, however, gave me plenty of time to lie around perusing the social media outlets. Besides keeping up with how everybody was doing, I was taken by how many believed that these two horrendous hurricanes, Harvey then Irma, were thought to be conspiracies, that the two strongest hurricanes EVER were man made atrocities. Some believed that the Federal Government was behind the whole thing, to what end I still can't figure out. Some thought that they were God's way of punishing humanity for their evil ways. Some feel that if there weren't so many gays getting married and LGTBQ in the military, this would never have happened. Some people (like me) believe that this is an excellent example of the results from global warming. I believe that whether global warming is natural or man-made, or a combination of both, the real issue is what we can do to slow it down. Anyway.... I actually want to discuss another conspiracy theory I've been reading a lot about lately. It's one of the strangest ones out there. There's been a lot of articles lately on my "news feed" about the Flat Earth Society.

Flat Earthers, as they are called, believe that the earth is actually a flat disc, propelling through space. They believe us "round earthers", or RE's, have been flamboozled by the powers that be into believing that the Earth is like spherical shape. Why would the world powers want to pull off such an elaborate hoax? What would be the reasoning behind convincing everybody that the Earth is round when it is actually flat? What's at the end of the Earth's edges? How do you explain pictures from space showing the earth to be a globe shaped object? How can you prove that the Earth is flat? 
Lineman's Letter

Ricky "Rock'em-Sock'em" Lewis, the longtime drummer of local Rock Octet, Born to Fun, did something nobody ever expected. No-one saw it coming, not even himself. Neighbors and bandmates were stunned when Lewis was seen parking his late 1980's Chevy Van at the band's bassist's house, where he then began to unload his drum set into the garage, to which he apparently knew the entry code.

Bassist Billy Childs recalls a strong sense of alarm when he heard the rattle and hum of his motorized garage door as it was opening. "I thought maybe my girlfriend came home early or maybe was fired from her dead-end job that pays for most of our mortgage. I thought briefly how maybe we weren't going to get discounts on twenty four packs of our favorite light beer in a can, I was scared for a moment," Childs told reporters. "Turns out she was working a double after all. It was Ricky.

Third-guitarist Mike Mansion was wheeling his amp into position in the garage-turned-practice room when the segmented metal door began opening upward. "I saw light coming in. I have never seen that much light come into this room in the eighteen years

we have been having band practice in here. I was able to see some things I hadn't seen in a very long time. In just the few short minutes the door was up before the sun was down I found two Les Pauls, about twenty blue guitar picks, and my flannel overshirt from before we changed our band name from Mighty-Sister-Matchbook-8 to the current name. After a moment of scurrying about like a looter in a candy riot I finally saw that it was Ricky who had opened the door. My jaw dropped to the floor, along with everything I was holding," Mansion relayed. "I was without any words. Nope. No words, man."

Shortly thereafter, the first and second guitarists, the keyboardist, singer, and deejay all arrived at the rehearsal house. Amid inquisitive looks, shrugs, and text message thread theories of Ricky maybe having been kicked out of his home by his mother (with whom he'd be living with the past twelve years after a brief stint in the Coast Guard reserves) or had perhaps had some vacation days from his employer he had to 'use or lose', the band members arranged and powered on their equipment in relative silence.

At precisely 8:30 in the evening the entire band was set up and ready to roll. Before the first downbeat, and actually interrupting the swinging arm of the second guitarists dramatic windmill pick strike, the singer preemptively halted the band. The air in the old garage was musty and thick and still. Then came the cutting question to Ricky. "Hey man, what gives? Are you ok?" singer/frontperson and all around great guy Frank Rivers asked.

After a sloppy pause, Ricky is reported to have said to his band leader, "Huh?"

Nearby freight cars moving along the railway muffled the rest of the conversation as it could be heard outside by neighbors, but further investigation revealed that there was indeed nothing wrong.

The band had been on edge since they first saw Ricky and was elated to discover that he was only accidentally on time to band practice. It turned out that the clock in his van had stopped working earlier in the day, causing him to be mistaken about the actual time of day from then on. Apparently, the time on the stopped clock was precisely ninety minutes off from the time of his wristwatch, which he dutifully adjusted to his usually-reliable van clock. Ricky had no idea he was early to band practice. He told reporters, "I thought everyone else was showing up a little later than usual, but ya know, I didn't wanna say anything cuz ya know I'm just back here trying to have a good time and not bust anybody's chops or nothin', ya know?"

The eight piece band hopes to eventually learn a set's worth of songs from start to finish with the next year or so, according to the Ricky's mother (who, interestingly, is a founding member of a for-profit online group dedicated to vetting the credibility of online catcharities.) She also tells us that the band would love to start playing benefit shows in the near future, but only "the right ones for the right reasons."

The bassist's girlfriend was unable to be reached for comment nor was she able to be confirmed to actually exist.

In fact, none of the above actually happened. None of those people exist. Have a great day!

Swamp Music

reedence Clearwater Revival wrote all about life in the bayous of Louisianna and the Okefenokie swamp. Eastern Louisianna is almost all swamp with towns and cities connected by a series of bridges. It's a gorgeous place, and very inspiring. If you are unfamiliar with the Okefenokie it's in southern Georgia and feeds the world famous Suwanee river which enters Florida and emptys into the Gulf of Mexico on our West Coast near Cedar Key. Enough on geography though. My original point is Creedence was from California. That's right, the guys who wrote Born on the Bayou, Green River, Willie and the Poor Boys, and so much more about the swamps and life in the bayous didn't really have any idea what that life is really about. Where they got their inspiration is beyond me. At least the guys that wrote the song Swamp Woman, the Stranger band were/ are from Florida and do know some folks from the swamps. I'm one of them.

The juke box at Gator Hook Lodge was mostly Country and Western music but I would try and corner the guy that serviced and updated the music when he came in and talked him into adding some rock selections and a little diversity. Usually the juke box played almost all day until the live music began. As I have mentioned before the most famous guy to play my family's bar on a regular basis was Bluegrass legend Ervin Rouse. Along with Ervin there were a stable of regular folks that would either jam occasionally or sit in frequently. My oldest sister Joyce was a talented guitarist, bassist, vocalist that was often on stage with various other players. One could hear Country, Bluegrass, and even the rare Creedence song.

I was always a fan of rock and roll. The very first record that I ever personally purchased was Jimi Hendrix's *Crosstown Traffic*. It didn't quite fit in with Tammy Wynett, Hank Snow or their contemporaries. I had been playing drums since I was a little turd but never with a band until one Friday night when the band was all in the bar but there wasn't a drummer in the house. My sister suggested that I fill in. I

wasn't really thrilled about playing country mind you. Although I had great respect for the artists, it just wasn't me. My bedroom upstairs contained my record collection full of albums by bands like YES, Emerson, Lake & Palmer, Deep Purple, Genesis and more. The closest thing I owned to a country record was probably a Doobie Brothers record, and the only reason I owned that was because I had to learn a couple of their songs for a band I was singing in in Miami. Well, I could do three sets of simple rhythms and net forty bucks or sit around waiting for someone to start a fight so I opted to play. I can still remember it like it was last month. My idea of a great drummer at the time was Ian Pace, Bill Bruford, and Carl Palmer so keeping it simple was a bit more than I was ready for. After the first set ended my sister asked me to reel it in a bit as I was over playing. At first I was a tad upset but eventually came to realize that she was right. I began to listen a little more carefully to the songs that were being played on the jukebox and soon after I was doing a bit of Western Swing along with some slow shuffles. It didn't take long before I was playing along with the band and keeping things simple enough to make the other guys (and Joyce) happy. In addition to the actual musicians that hit the Gator Hook stage there was almost always some inebriated sot that would try his hand at the harmonica or wander in with a washtub, a broomstick and a string. Back country bass is what I think it was called. They would place the broomstick on the tub with the string attached between the two and pull the stick to different tautness and as a result create different bass notes. Basic yet effective believe it or not. I still prefer the tone and accuracy of a Fender Precision though. I have even seen guys play a damned washbord as a percussion instrument there as odd as that seems.

After that fateful night I played on a pretty regular basis with Joyce, Ervin, and many more. I never did get to play drums or sing with Charlie Daniels though. Gator Hook was in the middle of Florida's biggest tourist destination at the time. There was no Disney World or Universal yet. There was the Everglades. Over the years we had more than our share of celebrities visit our little bar in the swamp. There were only a handful of places to stop and get a bite to eat or a cold drink and we were one of the most well known. It was an uneventful Sunday afternoon with folks shooting pool, fishing across the road, airboating, and just enjoying a cold beer while enjoying the swamp life.

I was behind the bar when a small group of folks entered the bar through that old wooden framed screen door. Some wore plaid shirts and jeans, some were dressed a bit better. Almost all of them had cowboy hats. The group sat themselves at one of our wooden picnic tables and soon realized that we didn't have table service. Soon one of them sidled up to the bar and ordered beer and soda after returning to the table they sat and watched the goings on. It wasn't too long

Buying And Selling Real Estate AFTER A Hurricane

Thope everyone has been able to clean up, regroup, and get their lives back to some sense of normalcy after Hurricane Irma blew thorough Brevard County and our whole state. The whole experience from beginning to end can be very exasperating and draining. So let's all try to keep a positive attitude and take time to help others with whatever we can, and that should help us all put that storm behind us.

There are many areas and items to consider when buying and selling real estate after a major storm. So let's take a look at the major concerns that may affect selling price and time on the market

First for buyers, I suggest taking time for a meeting with everyone involved in the purchase to determine if you still wish to move forward with a home purchase. Discuss with your partner any change in your financial condition, your will to still commit to a long term loan, and your desire to remain in this area. Many people have jobs that keep them here, so you may not have much of a choice to leave the area

Once you have reexamined your desire to go forward with a purchase, now it is time to research houses. Try to find houses that did not receive any significant damage from the storm. Talk to the realtor and also talk to neighbors about any damage in the neighborhood. Ask the seller if he had a post-storm home inspection completed, and be sure to obtain a copy of that to review. And be sure to obtain the names of any repairmen and contractors who completed any fix up tasks since the storm.

When you have found the house you wish to buy, keep in mind that there are fewer buyers out there than before the hurricane. Also, we are now in the traditionally slower season of home selling here. Therefore, even though we are still in a Seller's Market, some sellers may be more receptive to an offer that is lower than the asking price. Upon a successful negotiation to purchase a home, a necessary and very important of the process to purchase is a Home Inspection. Hire a professional home inspector to denote the condition of the property. Most homes will have sustained some damage, some of it has been repaired, some of it may not have been addressed by the owner. Discuss with your inspector the importance of any items that are not function-

ing properly or of any items that are deficient. Then you must make the determination as to how important those items are to you to be working correctly for the price you are paying for the house.

Buyers should keep their lender in the loop as to the condition and any repairs needed to determine how it might affect the loan approval. Sellers also have several areas to consider if they wish to continue to attempt to sell their home. They should take a good look at the condition, noting any damages or changes in the property since the hurricane hit. Check your insurance policy to determine your coverage and deductible so that you will know just what your cash expenditures will be to correct any damage. Or if not able to correct the damage, a list price with fix up costs in mind should be considered. Buyers may still purchase a home, especially with a renovation loan, if they want that house even if the condition is not A-1.

Another factor to consider when selling after a big storm is that there will most likely be fewer buyers in the market. Some buyers just get scared off, or some put their purchase on hold to think it over. Also, with fewer ready, willing, and able buyers out there searching, the time to sell a home may take longer that pre-hurricane market time. So sellers need to consider the extended market time it may take to accomplish a sale at their preferred price. As stated above, there may very well be fewer qualified buyers in the marketplace, so sellers may need to adjust their asking price if the market slows down. A seller's main goal is to sell!! But it may not always be at their intended price, as a hurricane affects the market in many ways. I always suggest that both buyers and sellers seek professional counsel from an experienced realtor, who can explain the nuances of buying and selling real estate after a hurricane.




