




A Rock'n'Roll Wedding

Sal Valentinetti

hen you hear the term "crooner," you think of great voices like Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin, Tony Bennett, back in the days when the world was a lot softer, cleaner and friendlier. At second glance you realize that the list of famous crooners goes on and on ... Harry Connick, Jr., Barry Manilow, Michael Bublé, yes, even rocker Rod Stewart belong into this category. This is by no means a dying genre, and they might just be the greatest male singers ever, many have become legends and larger than life. And then there are the ones "in the making" and Sal "The Voice" Valentinetti has put his singing career into overdrive ever since his applauded performance in the 11th season finals of the TV show "America's Got Talent" in September 2016. He didn't win, Sal made 5th place out of 10, but he received standing ovations, an impressed nod from Simon Cowell, and the coveted "Golden Buzzer" from a very excited Heidi Klum. Overnight this 21 year old, clean-cut, well-dressed, pleasant, and mature mannered crooner rose to stardom, and this was Sal's chance to turn his "15 minutes of fame" into a longlasting music career. Brevard Live Magazine had the opportunity to converse with him about his sudden fame, the rollercoaster ride of the last six months, his hopes and dreams and ask him (please imagine the distinguished New York-Italian accent) - "How you doing?"

"I feel so blessed," Sal says with a forceful voice, then he starts talking about his family, especially about his Uncle Joe. "He helped me with my self-confidence. You know, I wasn't good-looking, a bit chubby, other kids were making fun of me, and it was my Uncle Joe who understood my personality and told me never to change who I am."

It doesn't take long to realize just how tenacious he is. Sal Valentinetti seems to be quite comfortable in his skin and if you watch his AGT performance, you'd think he's dealt with large crowds for decades. Not your typical 21-year-old by any means. From a very young age Sal was influenced by his grandmother, Tina Valentinetti, to love the musical genius of Dean Martin, Tony Bennett and Frank Sinatra but he didn't find out that he had a voice until he was 15. "I had a private music teacher and I played the horn and trombone in our high school band. At one practice I was asked to sing "Mack the Knife" and we all were surprised about my voice. Sure I sang in the shower but never in front of other people." And once again, Uncle Joe encouraged him to pursue his dreams,

advised him to enter different contests - "You know I also tried out for American Idol. Uncle Joe even got me a gig at a restaurant where I performed for \$100 every Thursday." (He laughs) "He said to me 'they love who you are, this is only the beginning'." Unfortunately Uncle Joe didn't live to see his vision come true. Shortly before Sal's AGT break-through he passed away.

So how has his life changed? "Well, I used to delivered pizza for my cousin's Italian restaurant while going to college; I hung out with my family and friends on the weekend. It was pretty simple. Now I am performing in London, Paris, or just last night in Phoenix, places I never thought I would see." And how does he handle it? "I have the right people in my life, and when I travel, I take my family with me. I hire my family members, just like family businesses do. We help each other out and make big decisions together."

Sal left for Hollywood as a pizza delivery man and returned home to Bethpage as a National Rock Star. His live show, featuring his new band "The Black Tie Brass", is now in great demand. Sal "The Voice" Valentinetti sold out three Christmas Shows at the now famous, Paramount Theatre in Huntington, New York. Then his dream came true, an opportunity to perform in the round at one of Frank Sinatra's favorite venues. The Theatre at Westbury (formerly The Westbury Music Fair). Sal loves to tell the story of how his father saved up just enough money to see Frank Sinatra on June 11, 1975 in Westbury. The Valentinetti family returned to Westbury on March 3, 2017 and they watched with pride as Sal performed his 90 minute show to a sold out crowd of 3,000 people just like his idol, Frank Sinatra.

After Sal's successful sell out shows at home, he teamed up with some of the country's top promoters and agents like Brian Rosenberg, Robert Maffia, Fever Entertainment and TCI Talent Agency and is now touring

the country as one of the hottest new performers on the scene. They are all young people, Sal's manager Tommy is merely 23.

In between shows on the road, Sal is in the studio working on his first EP which is scheduled to be out in Spring of 2017. Sal: "All recording is done, now it just has to be mastered and will be available on my website." His next

project is a reality show and "we already started taping."

Sal is not only influencing people with his music, he has also become a role model for Millennials. Mr. Valentinetti was named "Restaurants Against Drunk Driving" (RADD) Man of the Year 2016.




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RENAISSANCE RISING

Former Chocolate Factory Now Houses A New Emporium



Time changed and so did the chocolate. Chocolate covered potato chips were the new addiction in the 80s and the Grimaldi's had the best, selling the

goods right there in downtown Melbourne from the factory to the public. In 2000 Vincent decided to sell his business and stay on as a consultant. In 2012 new owners decided to leave the old chocolate factory in downtown Melbourne to build a new facility in Rockledge. 815 Strawbridge Avenue was a gigant empty space. Until now! After two years of renovation, Caroline Grimaldi opened the doors to her new emporium called "The Shoppes On Strawbridge" featuring 18 shoppe owners selling their arts and crafts, and that includes paintings, carvings, jewelry, bathing suits, southern caramel, pottery, even home-made soups. "A lot of shoppe owners have sold their goods on the internet but feel the need to have some brick and mortar as well," said Caroline. "They don't have the time to produce while selling and dealing with the public. We do." She spent years as a financial adviser for big firms and understands "family business." She's the right person for the job.

What's an emporium without community involvement? Two more rooms of the former chocolate factory are under construction. The 1,000 sq. ft. candy kitchen will house a cafe, and the 1,500 sq. ft. warehouse has already

SNOWBIRDSOf The Streets

Like so many before and legions more sure to follow, Josh and Kara (not their real names) did not come to Florida to vacation, they came to Florida because they were running away from their former lives up north. Abusive relationships, violence, drugs, unemployment and cold weather drove them to pack their meager belongings into a questionably roadworthy Kia and flee to the sunshine and relative serenity of Brevard County. Like most transplants from Indiana they had friends in the area to provide a few friendly couches to crash on in the early days of their arrival but, after a few hot showers here and home cooked dinners there, Josh and Kara decided to start their own lives on the streets and beaches of Melbourne.

"I'm happier than I've ever been in my life" smiles Kara. "I'm completely free. Josh and I found each other at the right time of life for each of us. We're very much in love and want to get married. We've started a new life together and it's awesome."

After sleeping on the beach for a few weeks ("Once you get past the beauty of sleeping under the stars to the sound of the waves thing, the sand gets pretty hard to sleep on" says Josh) the couple met other street people and learned the lay of the land, as it were. They're currently living in a wooded homeless camp with about 12 others, take their meals at Daily Bread, spend their days on the beach, and are reveling in the peace of mind that stepping away from mainstream society provides.

"We were down to our last three dollars" Josh relates, "and Kara, being the good hearted person she is, saw a guy with a sign saying 'Homeless Vet Please Help'. We pulled up and offered him the three dollars but he took one look at us and said 'You guys living in your car? I can't take your money... Come back in two hours and I'll take you to a place you can crash...""

The man led them to the camp in the woods and they've been staying there in a tent with brand new queen mattress (Pillowtop! Josh is always quick to include) that a friend bought them, for about two months now. As they've gotten to know the people of the streets and the support structure that revolves around them, Josh and Kara live

a simple life one day at a time. They have no plans for the future except that they know it'll soon be too hot to remain in the area when the full Florida summer comes to bear.

Josh had been doing day labor but when I asked if he'd been working lately his simple reply was "No. Don't need to really... we're good." He'd injured himself hauling concrete on one of his day labor gigs and the \$53 dollars a day he earns that way didn't seem worth getting hurt all over again.

Being the only ones in camp with a car, Josh and Kara make a few dollars giving rides to others. At least two of the camp residents have full time jobs and while I was visiting one stopped by to ask for a ride to pick up his paycheck and a run by the bank to cash it. The man, let's call him Bob, has been in this spot for seven years now. Bob works, pays taxes, presents well, and has no desire to join the straight world and the responsibilities it engenders. Josh and Kara laugh about Bob's well appointed camp and call him a 'Glamper' (Glamorous Camper). If you stood next to Bob in Winn Dixie you'd never know he was homeless. But then, he's not really. His home is here and Josh and Kara are his neighbors.

According to Josh, "Living this way is pretty much the same as doing a music festival or touring with The Grateful Dead back in the day. Kara never got to do those things so she's getting the experience this way. Just like a Dead tour, peanut butter is always on the menu and if you don't have any bread the old 'finger sandwich' will get you by!" Josh laughs aloud, kicks back in his camp chair, and demonstrates his enjoyment of breakfast at it's most basic...

"The hardest thing is to stay organized, we carry supplies back here in crates, we wash dishes in that old broken cooler over there, but stuff just kind of piles up." As testa-

ment to that Josh points at an impressive pile of empty Natural Ice beer cans and laughs at what he calls 'The Savings Account'. There's also an extra 'Guest Tent' for when they have friends to stay. Sometimes fellow street people will get a hotel room for the night and invite Josh and Kara over for hot showers or to spend the night inside for a change. Hot showers are the one thing Kara misses in her new transient lifestyle but it's not enough to make her want to settle down into a more traditional and static way of living.

Josh experiences only one downside to his current living arrangement:

"The bad thing about living out here is the raccoons, they come into camp every night. They ripped into our tent twice (one of the other camp residents is a seamstress and repaired the tent for them) while we were away and they make a lot of noise crashing around the place. Of course one thing about this place is that it's the only neighborhood where you can get away with getting screaming drunk and hootin' and hollerin' at three in the morning. Where else can you get away with that? I guess you could call that a plus or a minus depending on your position on the subject."

The camp maintains its own sort of HOA

Josh, like most in the itinerant neighborhood, is not a dumb person and the camp has a longtime occupant that's earned the title of Mayor. Residents that bring in new people, the way Josh and Kara were brought in, present their case before the Mayor and a resident's council to decide if they'll be allowed to stay. The camp maintains its own sort of HOA that keeps order and Living this way is pretty much the same as doing a music festival or touring with The Grateful continued page 19

Dead. Josh says, "Everyone here is super cool but that's not the case everywhere. Daytona is not cool, the street people there are real mean and Cocoa Beach sucks because you have to pay to park everywhere!"

People, both street people and straight people, have been very kind to the couple. A friend from back home bought the mattress and a cell phone. strangers share money, food, and time, and lunch at The Daily Bread gets them all the nourishment they need for the day. Kara, nearly skeletal on arrival, has put on twenty pounds since fleeing Indiana and when lunchtime rolled around we all went to 'The Bread' for the day's main meal. A surprisingly tasty, well presented cafeteria lunch was served by upbeat, smiling volunteers in a clean and relaxed environment. With a mixed greens salad, brussels sprouts, pulled pork and rice, fresh Publix bread and butter, ice tea and dessert it was a healthful and satisfying meal that would have cost at least \$12.95 at a local lunch joint. It was so good I'm thinking about taking my in-laws there when they visit next month...

With the few bucks they get as a homeless taxi service and erratic stints with Day Labor, Josh grins as he sings the words to the iconic Grateful Dead song "Cumberland Blues": Gotta get down to the Cumberland Mine, that's where I mainly spend my time, make good money five dollars a day, if I made any more I might move away...

Summer is coming and they know they'll need to move northward soon but, for now, life is pretty good for these snowbirds of the streets. After spending a day in their world one may ask:

"What exactly constitutes a 'home' anyway?"

PHONELESS IN PHOENIX

Arriving back at Phoenix's Sky Harbor Airport Terminal 4 the pilot announced, "If everyone could please sit tight, we'll let you know any updates as soon they're received. We're not sure how long this may take. Please stay in your seats and wait for further information..."

The one hundred or so San Diego-bound souls were grumbly but surprisingly calm considering the circumstances... It wasn't long before the pilot's next address: "Folks, we really can't tell you when this plane will be going to San Diego but it will be at least 90 minutes before we have any new information. If you'd like to deplane to stretch your legs or grab some breakfast, you may leave your luggage on the plane and listen to the terminal PA for announcements about departure. Again, leave your luggage on the plane and listen for announcements in the terminal. Thank you for flying Southwest."

The airport was barely awake as the still stranded passengers dragged back into Terminal 4 and the shops and restaurants that were actually open at 8AM had no customers. A bored server at an empty food counter was kind enough to let me use her phone and leave another "I really can't tell you when I'll get there" message for the Balloon Guru before I downed a burrito and got back on the now empty plane. There was no way I would be held hostage to PA announcements in Terminal 4. I spread out in my vacant aisle, put a jacket over my eyes, and drifted off to sleep.

The sound of the pilot's announcement jolted me up with a slap to the senses that no one on the now half filled airplane could have predicted: "Sorry to tell you this folks but this plane will not be going to San Diego today. As a matter of fact, San Diego remains fogged in and I don't think any planes are going to San Diego today. Please take your luggage off of the plane and make arrangements with the attendants at the boarding gate for a flight tomorrow. Thank you for flying Southwest."

There was a stunned silence as this registered in our collective heads. I had a Mike Doughty concert to attend at 8PM and even though I'd been traveling 24 hours it seemed impossible to make showtime - now only nine hours away.

As I turned my head to exit I locked eyes with a man on the other side of the aisle. He'd come in while I slept, I'd never seen him before in my life, but his eyes burrowed straight into mine as he growled "Screw this! I'm about ready to rent a damn car and drive to San Diego!".

I held his gaze and growled right back. "If you'll drive it, I'll pay for it."

"Deal" he said.

"Deal" I said.

Without breaking our (was it camaraderie or confrontation?) staredown we shook hands and gave each other the eyes-locked 'Let's Roll' nod. He collected his girlfriend, I grabbed my bags, and we trooped off the grounded Southwest Airlines plane in a stark march that only times of trouble bring to total strangers. For better or worse we were committed, that was obvious, neither of us would back down from our bargain or back out of our spontaneously tenuous partnership.

His clothes and demeanor were classic biker. Long hair banded up, head scarf, full beard, black leather vest, jeans, boots, chain wallet, Harley Davidson T-shirt - check, check, check. His lady friend also sported the classic biker look and I found comfort in the assumption that they'd be easy folks to have a beer with at Earl's Hideaway Lounge. Still, no one slumping off that plane was in a good mood and it would be a mistake to try and predict how that our anxious energy would play out. They felt it, I felt it. For the next seven hours or so we'd be bombing through the American desert locked together in a small rental car. All we needed was Zac Galifianakis and a small dog to complete the scene.

An angry walk through the airport, a stressed out ride on a shuttle bus and finally, after a full forty minutes, we stood side by side at the rental car counter. Very little small had talk passed between us and it wasn't until we were actually booking the car that I turned to my new, soon to be very familiar acquaintance and said, "I'm John, what's your name anyway?"

We saw the advent of CDs, VHS, cellphones, flat screen TVs, that little vacuum thing that goes around scaring the cat, and of course, personal computers. Nowadays, we have a constant connection to everything we could ever want to know. Want to find out about the sex life of a yak in Inner Mongolia? No problem, Google it on your phone. Want to find the lowest price on chocolate covered bacon? In mere seconds you can not only have the lowest price, but a map showing the quickest route to go buy them. Want to talk to someone in Borneo? It's just a button push away. We are inundated by information 24/7. We are con-

nected, for the first time ever, to EVERYTHING! And everything, it seems is connected to us. We can learn pretty much anything we want, yet how do we utilize this technology? SPRING FEVER!

People keep telling me it's spring time here in sunny FLA, but I could almost swear spring doesn't exist anymore in the southeast. And even though we are hitting the high 80s every day, it's still the most popular time of year for starry eyed soul mates to tie it up, and that's good for guys like me who have taken to DJing weddings and events to supplement my starving artist income, but every ceremony that has me standing sideline on the beach or in the middle of a lawn in a full on suit this time of year makes me wonder how this trend will continue as the temperature continues to rise.

But I digress. Where were we? Oh yes, it's a tale as old as the wind. A young warrior armed with six strings of honor sets out to light the world on fire with his music-seeking fame and fortune... and a paycheck... until one day he wakes up to realize he is forty and his audience is more likely to be the dinner crowd at beachside restaurants instead of stadiums filled with screaming fans. He doesn't want to work a real job, and he has all this sound equipment, so he starts DJing for extra cash. DJing part time turns into club gigs, more equipment, cooler lights, weddings, parties, etc..., and along the way our hero discovers there is a lot of work that goes into DJing. I'm sure you have heard it a million times over.

It's actually a wonderful way to make money, and truth be told, I kind of love it; and I'm good at it; who knew?

So, let's talk a bit about weddings because I have noticed some trends and patterns. If you are planning a wedding soon, or planning to have a wedding soon, or you will soon be planning to plan a wedding you may want to pay extra careful attention to the rest of this article. I'm probably going to be dropping some helpful info along the way.

First off! I cannot stress to you enough how important it is to pick a good matron of honor. Go crazy with your bridesmaids, pick your friends, pick fun people, pick outgoing people (you don't want drags in your wedding crew trust me), the matron (maid if you like) of honor has got to be a rock though. She needs to be trust worthy, ambitious, resourceful, and care about your needs before all others... until after the wedding of course. I have seen it go bad so many times when the maid of honor drops the ball. That lady is your personal assistant as well as the coordinator

for all of your bridesmaids all the way up until you leave the reception, so pick wisely and make sure they are up for the task. Fellas, same thing when it comes to your best man - unless you want a lame bachelor party, then ignore me.

Notes for maids of honor, and best men: Best Man, don't use the words "dude", "bro", "chicks", or anything else heard around a frat house during your speech. Have fun, be sincere, tell a funny story, and wrap it up with a classy "love you man, cheers!" Short and sweet is key.

Maids of Honor, almost every successful maid of honor speech follows this pattern "I met (bride's name) when we were (blah blah blah), and from that moment on we were best friends (blah blah), then one day she told me about this guy she was seeing and I could tell right away it was different (blah blah blah), and now he's like a brother to me (blah blah). I'm so happy you two found each other..." and then you cry, and the bride cries.

Photography, photography, photography! Hire good people to get it all, both still shots and video. You will be so nervous and stressed the whole thing will be done in a flash and you will have missed a lot of it simply because you can't be everywhere at once. And if your pics turn out badly then you will have to either suck it up, or wait for your next wedding to try it again. More and more I see photographers trending towards two photo shoots during the reception. They traditionally will take you for an hour or two and shoot pics right after the ceremony, but lately I've been noticing a second shoot a bit later during the "golden hour", when the sun is lower and the light is the most flattering. If you want to do that - cool, you will get some great pics. However, you should also remember that all of those hours you are gone your guests are just hanging out wondering what's going to happen next and drinking your bar out of liquor. Telling the DJ in advance so they (I) can plan something during that time could save that situation.

And when it comes to DJs. you get what you pay for; this is not where you want to skimp. Unless your good buddy Joe Schmoe is a pro DJ with a lot of wedding experience, hiring your friends is almost always a mistake. This is going to be both one of the best and most stressful days of your life; get someone you can trust will take some of that stress away from you and run the show like a pro ringmaster should. It doesn't have to me (shameless plug #4) but be sure about who you hire, because they can make or break your big day if they aren't experienced, confident, charismatic, and hands on.

In the end the biggest, most useful piece of advice I can offer is to simply stick to your guns about what you want and not let others sway you towards things you don't. Your friends will offer advice they think you should


out being ambushed by topics that are irrelevant. The world is boiling with tension right now. Let's blow off steam without creating more heat. (End of Rant)

It is also the dry season in the Everglades. When it is dry in the northern part of the state it definitely affects the Glades. For those that did not know it, Orlando is historically the place where the headwaters to the Everglades begin. So, if it doesn't rain there, it is an indicator of a shortage down south. In addition to that, decades ago in their infinite wisdom the Corps of Engineers deviated water flow in order to drain the swamps and develop more land for the housing boom.

Then there is sugar... When Castro first took over Cuba we Americans lost our sugar supply. What to do? Florida's climate is almost identical to Cuba and as such was the obvious answer. I mean, we cannot possibly survive without

our sugar now can we? The sugar companies diverted water from Lake Okeechobee (which also feeds the Glades) and as a result even less water was reaching the places that nature had intended it to. I feel I have to add here that the housing boom is still in full swing and as for our addiction to sugar well, we are consuming more than ever. Lovely huh?

Florida has the second highest rate of wildfires in the nation. If you are a smoker use an ashtray, if you are cooking out, use common sense and caution. If you think that not being able to cross state routes 528 or 192 because of smoke is an inconvenience, think about no longer having a home due to fire. It happens all the time, folks.

When I was a kid in the Glades and fire season neared. dad and others would all help each other out and create 'fire breaks' around homesteads, and properties. A fire break is similar to a road in the woods. Usually cleared by someone with a bulldozer. If everything works as planned the fire reaches the break and doesn't proceed further. Sometimes a fire will jump a break. It happens on major roadways as well. Fire has even been known to jump I-95. There really is no way to determine where a fire will go, especially when the wind kicks up. I've had friends that have lost their homes to fire. I was fortunate. Never happened to us. When the fires are huge and headed to your house you do everything you can to save your home. If you are lucky you may sustain a little damage. If not, you're homeless. As a kid I never really took it seriously. I don't think my friends did either. When the fires came we would position ourselves near the edge and capture animals and snakes as they fled the blaze. One can see more fauna in escape mode in an afternoon than you might see in an average six months. Deer, hogs, opossum, armadillo, otter, panther, you name it. If it is running from fire the odds of an encounter are tenfold. I saw just about everything except panthers. They were much more rare back then. And I would imagine that there are even more interesting things to be seen these days. Pythons and Komodo dragons are just a couple that come to mind.

So, as a Floridian who loves this place and has seen what can happen up close, I encourage all of you to please use care when smoking, or using fire in any manner. Because it's not just yours...

That's my Flori-Duh too!

- Renting is a much more short term commitment than owning a home.


Each individual or couple should weigh all the above advantages and disadvantages of home ownership vs renting, and make a fully informed decision as to what works best for them.

"We can't arrest ourselves out of this problem" -anonymous Sheriff.

No, we can't. We are currently witnessing and experiencing an Opioid Addiction & Overdose Epidemic and we are all part of the solution. We are in the aftermath of the Pill Mill crackdown.

Pharmaceutical opiates (pain pills) have become more difficult to get due to government pressures, investigations, arrests, and regulations. Physicians have become more conservative with prescribing. The days of walking in with an MRI and a predetermined cocktail list of what medication you want filled for your cash contribution to the office, is over. Pharmacies scrutinize and review prescriptions with an ID Channel curiosity. Pharmaceutical companies put out "safer" alternatives and have switched their efforts to the medication assisted treatment space.

What remained was the countless number of addicts left craving, withdrawing, and struggling with a ruthless disease. We definitely weren't ready to help them all. As a community and country we weren't even ready to understand their suffering and need for help.

From the sickness, crime, and chaos came the perfect storm. Heroin is introduced to mainstream America. It's cheaper, easier to get, available in every neighborhood (yes, even yours), and you don't even need a fake MRI. Boom!

What can we do about this? The arrests and regulations alone can't do it. The planned deportations and blaming Mexico for our problem will not do it. Let me not go too far on this issue because I don't care about the politics, I only want to destroy this disease and save lives.

Crushing the stigma related to addiction, recovery, and those struggling with it is a great start. Creating more access to quality healthcare is another leap forward. A huge leap actually. Again, I don't want to get too deep into our healthcare problems because it will turn this into a political discussion.

Our solution includes admitting that this epidemic is here and our friends, loved ones, children, parents, and grandparents are all suffering from this. Knowing that heroin is not our initial problem because 80% of heroin addicts previously misused pain medications. Understanding that heroin and pain medications are Opioid Agonists. That means that heroin and pain medications are the same to the brain. In basic street language we have illegal heroin and legal heroin, only we didn't get to vote on this like we did on marijuana. The medicinal purpose of anything doesn't mean safe. It means that when done correctly it can be effective. Many people are prescribed pain medication for legitimate reasons but without an effective plan to discontinue or replace with a non-addictive alternative. The physical dependence can happen to anyone and come without notice. We are all vulnerable. What happens from here is fueled by many other factors. These can be emotional, environmental, and/or genetic.

The alternative procedures and treatments require more research and approval for medical billing. The replacement therapies need to be supported and monitored so that recovering addicts don't become a targeted population for those only interested in another revenue stream. For example, it's unfortunate that even when you have medical insurance and go to an in-network healthcare provider, they only accept self-pay for addiction treatment. Can you imagine if your doctor required you to pay cash for any cardiac issue because your insurance carrier doesn't offer an adequate reimbursement? If diabetics had to self-pay? How is this acceptable?

Lastly, we can all carry a form of Naloxone. Naloxone is a medication that is used to prevent or reverse the effects of an opioid. It's being used to save the lives of individuals who are suffering from an overdose of opioid medication or heroin. It can be found under the brand names EVZIO and NARCAN. Any physician can prescribe it to you. Anyone can get it. Everyone should. If Zika killed just 10% of those killed by opioids daily, the antidote would be in every medicine cabinet.

Imagine sitting in a restaurant and your dinner is disrupted by cries that someone has been found in the bathroom unconscious. If you are armed with Naloxone you can use it on the individual while someone calls 911. If the person is suffering from an opioid overdose you will see an immediate reversal in action. You just bought this person some time until the emergency services arrives. You just saved a life. A life that would've otherwise been lost. If the person was not suffering from an opioid overdose the medication will not work but most importantly is not known to further complicate any other health emergency. Please google Naloxone for more information and how to get it.

I'm asking us all to be the solution. Be armed with knowledge, empathy, and Naloxone. Feel free to contact me directly for any additional assistance on how to navigate the "business" of recovery and get help NOW.

Comfort food is hearty, nostalgic and most always homemade. Each culture has their own concept of comforting foods. When I'm craving Mexican food, there's nothing better than diving into a plate of spicy taco meat wrapped in warm tortilla shells with cool, crisp toppings. It takes me back to my vacation in Oaxaca.

El Indio which is located in the Melbourne Shopping Center on Babcock Street is a mom and pop style eatery with food made from the heart. The shopping center exterior might fool you but once inside, you'll find it to be clean, colorful and quite charming. Owner Ramon has been in business as a restaraunteer in Brevard County for over 20 years and being from Guadalajara he is quite familiar with Mexican cuisine.

As a chef he is passionate about the food he serves and all of his menu items are made fresh from scratch daily. Mexicans are not fans of frozen, processed foods. Instead they would rather turn chicken, pork, beef and seafood into harmonizing dishes that sing with flavor and tickle your mouth with texture. Whether your're in the mood for soup, salad or something heavier like fajitas or a huge burrito Ramon aims to please. He offers many gratifying entrees like Camaornes Al Mojo De Ajo (shrimp sauteed in garlic and butter with onions and mushrooms), Cartnitas (slow cooked pork), Carne Asada (charcoal broiled skirt steak) and Pollo En Mole (chicken in sweet brown sauce). During lunchtime El Indio has generous lunch plates for \$7.95 and fajitas or egg plates like Huevos Rancheros for \$8.95. They also have a daily special for only \$6.25 - what a deal! On top of that, free chips and house made salsa comes with each order.

They also serve some refreshing ethnic beverages like hand mixed sangria, margaritas and micheladas (Mexican bloody mary). On Cinco de Mayo El Indio will offer a va-



riety of discounted Mexican beers. Cinco de Mayo (May 5th) is a date that pays tribute to the surprising victory of the Mexican Army over French forces at the "Battle of Puebla" on May 5th in 1862. Some people think it's Mexico's independence day but that's actually on September 16th.

For Mother's Day this year Ramon will prepare special "Fajitas for Two" which come with any two beverages, alcoholic or non for \$27.95. It also comes with chip & salsa, beans and rice, warm tortillas and toppings. Perfect for sharing with Mom. They are open 7 days a week from 11am to 9pm so when that Mexican food craving strikes, Ramon and the staff at El Indio will be there to fill your belly and warm your soul.

Lori Emly has over 20 years experience working in the visual art field and currently owns and runs Art Abilities in the Eau Gallie Arts District. A self proclaimed average artist but very good teacher, Lori is more interested in sharing her knowledge than showing her work. In her own words "It is my passion, teaching others to be, or feel, successful." At that, she has been very successful.

Raised in Melbourne and a Mel. High graduate, Emly's parents moved her here in 1968. "It was pretty laid back then," she says. "Wickham Road ended at Wickham Park and there were a lot of dirt roads. Everything was tied into the space industry and there were lots of engineers around. I grew up with rockets going off and I still love watching the rockets go. Some people have gotten blasé about it but to me it's still an impressive thing."

Growing up surrounded by rocket scientists it's not surprising that Emly graduated college with degrees in computer science and electrical engineering before moving to Dallas to work for Texas Instruments. In Texas she participated in some exciting high tech projects with T.I. and other companies, even working in cutting edge cellular phone technology, before deciding to get her kids out of the fast paced city life and bring them back to her hometown.

"I wanted my kids to have a greater appreciation for things beside the rat race in Dallas. We'd always planned on moving back here so I moved back to the area in 2000 and got involved with the Melbourne Art Festival."

Emly spent 16 years working with the Melbourne Art Festival and held many positions including president, treasurer, coordinator for student programs and scholarships, and artist co-chairperson. "I'd done a lot of volunteer work in Dallas and when I came back here I had a friend, that had a friend, that got me involved in student scholarships and workshops. I've worked a lot of different positions but teaching is where my heart is."

Emly has also been involved with art and art therapy at The Haven for Children over many years. The Haven for Children is a foster group that helps kids in the system by trying to find them permanent home situations. They work with kids from birth to 18 that have been removed from their parents and an important part of their work is to keep families together. Sometimes four or five children from one family will arrive together at The Haven and it's one of the few programs that endeavor to keep these kinds of families together.

Florida Art

Art Therapy: At the pottery and fused-glass studio people can socialize while creating their own art.

In 2005 Emly started working for Brevard Achievement Center, a company in Rockledge that serves people with disabilities. She ran the school based art programs there under the program Very Special Arts, a national organization headquartered in South Florida until April 2016. "The VSA helps kids with art and art experiences" explains Emly. "Locally we work with public and private schools and have big events where we strive to expose young people to the arts. The arts are very empowering and help with expression. It's sad they're taking them out of schools - they're very important."

"In 2006 I started the art program at Brevard Achievement Center for Adults with disabilities, based out of Rockledge. The work is mostly in pottery and glass and with that population it's been a very successful program. We've paid for artists to come in for the adults. The students can sell their stuff and that's a good feeling for anybody. It's a big accomplishment. The work I've done there is one of my most proud achievements. Art work by the adults is sold at local art shows and in other retail locations in the area. I've also been a visiting artist for high school students and for elementary and middle school children with and without disabilities. I worked with the Holy Trinity High School art students to design and complete the two large fused glass windows that are installed at the upper campus small chapel - they are very impressive."

Since being back in the Melbourne area Emly has also taught pottery and fused glass at the Art Museum, Indian River Potters Guild and other locations.





"In May 2016 I opened Art Abilities, my first very own studio. I always say, I am an average artist but a very good teacher. It is my passion, teaching others to be, or feel, successful. I love doing what I'm doing - working my butt off! I don't make a lot of money but it's very rewarding. I get to do what I want."

Would-be artists can book parties at the pottery and fused-glass studio, bring along friends, food and drink, and socialize while creating their own art that will last forever. If classes are more your style Emly teaches fused glass and pottery all week long. "My classes are very small which I like. Whatever someone wants to achieve I help them with that. Everybody gets to do different things so with everyone at different levels it makes a conducive learning environment. You can learn from people around you. Mixing younger adults with older adults is good too, they can learn from each other."

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
