

TRADING SLEDS FOR SURFBOARDS: THE SURFING SANTAS

Surfing Santas return to Cocoa Beach for the eleventh year on December 24th. There's a very good reason folks along Florida's Space Coast flock to Cocoa Beach's downtown oceanfront early in the morning on Christmas Eve. Everyone wants to stake out a prime viewing spot for what has become a wildly popular annual ritual in these sunny seaside parts: the celebrated arrival of the "Surfing Santas."

This is an event any Tourism Office can dream about - and it all was initiated by a private Cocoa Beach family, the Trossets. 11 years later it is the biggest tourist attraction since NASA's space and shuttle program. Then, three years ago, The Surfing Santas became viral news with 1.8 Billion impressions and an earned media value of \$8,051,000.

Over 600 Surfing Santas showed up last year to catch some of Cocoa

Beach's finest waves, entertaining a beachside crowd estimated at 10,000. The local buzz for the 11th annual Surfing Santas extravaganza this December 24th dwells, as it always does, on just how many more Santas will take part compared to the previous year. Organizer George Trosset, who started this tradition somewhat by accident ten years ago, recently predicted that at least a thousand surfers will show up "to ride the Surfing Santas wave" at Cocoa Beach...

The 2019 event begins at 8 am with the sounds of a reggae band along the beach near 2 Minutemen Causeway (where the causeway intersects with N. Atlantic Avenue, also known as Florida Route A1A) and is expected to continue until early afternoon. Plenty of parking is available and numerous area restaurants will be open to serve Surfing Santas participants and spectators.

"Since Santa has a busy night ahead of him on Christmas Eve, he likes to spend the morning enjoying his favorite pastime, which is surfing," smiled Trosset. "And because Cocoa Beach is the East Coast surfing capital, it's no surprise he comes here to catch the best waves and mix with his fans. This is Central Florida's best Christmas party."

All this beachy holiday merriment is for a good cause. Proceeds from donations and sales of the official Surfing Santas T-shirt commemorating this free event benefit two local nonprofit organizations, *Grind for Life* and the *Florida Surf Museum*. More than \$100,000 has been collected for the two charities.

Grind for Life is a cancer support group whose mission is to provide financial assistance to cancer patients and their families when they travel long distances to visit doctors and hospitals. The 18-year-old Florida Surf Museum preserves and documents all aspects of the unique history and culture of Florida surfing, exposing visitors to the heritage and traditions of the surfing community.

Since anyone of any age can participate as a Surfing Santa, exactly how

many Santas will descend on Cocoa Beach this December 24th remains to be seen. The only requirement is to show up with your board and dressed as Santa or his helpers or any other character depicting the spirit of the season. In the past, there also have been reindeer and Christmas tree Surfing Santas, Rastafarian Surfing Santas, and even a Batman Surfing Santa. There are no rules about costumes, organizers point out, as long as one remembers this is a family oriented event. A costume contest open to the public has been added in 2017. Anyone in the crowd can participate by dressing up in a winter-themed outfit.

The first, very unofficial Surfing Santas event took place in 2009, when, on Christmas Eve, Trosset and his son, George Jr., and daughter-in-law Britteny thought it would be fun to go surfing in South Cocoa Beach dressed up as Santa Claus and his elves. When a photo of their antics hit the front page of a Florida newspaper, others wanted to join the fun. Since then, the number of Surfing Santas has grown almost exponentially each year.

In 2018, the day of after Christmas, *Fox News Channel's* "The Five," based in New York City, provided

video of the Surfing Santas as well as a description of the event, its Cocoa Beach locale, and fundraising objective. The story reached just under 2.5 million viewers, and had an equivalent buy value of \$400k. Just two days earlier, The Washington Post's story, "Hundreds of surfers in Santa suits ride waves in Florida," found an audience to over 275,000 readers. All across the United States - from KTLA 5 News in Los Angeles to WGN Early Morning News in Chicago - Surfing Santas saturated the airwaves and were recycled in print. The Butin report itemized a broadcast reach of 18.5 million views based on 370 mentions, with an earned media equivalency of about \$3.04 million. This constituted just over 86 percent of the event's total publicity value. But while broadcast dominates the publicity value generated, the nexus of the internet and social media heightens the event's reach. New web sites, online print and broadcast, social networking sites and blogs combined to yield 1,257 mentions and a reach of over 803 million views. This category provided the pathway for about 93 percent of the total reach, which amounted to some 862.5 million. Given the event's history, Surfing Santas imagery has probably been viewed well over a billion times, to the joy of children and adults alike. McDonalds was known for their advertisement of the billions of customers they served, but George Trosset takes pride in the "billions of smiles" his Surfing Santas deliver. And his numbers are right on.


Are there any other Surfing Santas around the world? - Brevard Live asked George Trosset. "Yes," he answered, "there is even one in Sydney, Australia. A few years ago I received a call from someone in Australia who wanted to sell us rash guard suits with a Santa design because he's heard about our event. Instead, I convinced him to start a surfing event in Sydney, and he did. Since Sydney has a population of over 5 Million, and Cocoa Beach about 12,000, they evertually will become the bigger event. But for now, we're still holding the world record."

On a rainy afternoon I headed down to the WFIT studios to meet Matthew Paul Miller and watch his performance on air. After getting caught in the rain, and it being a little early for me on a Friday, I walked into the studio and bee-lined it for the coffee maker in the kitchen. No sooner did I turn the corner did I realize that Miller was seated at the kitchen table texting. Surprised I asked "So, you're the guy huh?" To which he replied "Yep, guess I am."

With that I shook a friendly hello handshake and turned my attention back to making coffee. And that's how I met Matthew Paul Miller, also known by his orthodox Jewish name Matisyahu. Matisyahu started his career as MC Truth performing all over Oregon before changing his moniker to his traditional name. He has always been a huge fan of the band Phish and tried to follow them when he could. One night, at Bonnaroo in 2005, Phish even invited him onstage for a guest spot. After that, he went on to open for Dave Matthews, and even Sting.

In 2006, Matisyahu and his unique blend of orthodox views, hip hop, and reggae, broke out with his song 'King Without a Crown'—making the Modern Rock Top 10, and the Top 40s. Matisyahu was rocking a traditional Hassidic Jewish style back then and living the life as well. For a long time, it was difficult to book him because he wouldn't play on Fridays per Jewish law. Since then he has relaxed his style and dresses more like a Wailer than a

Rabbi, but he is still killing it in the reggae rap game.

After a well-structured interview with *Soundwaves* host Todd Kennedy, Matisyahu performed a couple songs live on air. To be honest, they weren't what I was expecting. I was used to hearing his fast rapping and rhythmic acrobatics, but instead he sang two songs along with an acoustic guitar and finished each selection with a round of beatboxing. I had taken a super fan

(Arlene that's you!) with me and was told that it was pretty standard these days. Either way, it was awesome, and I loved every second of it. After the radio gig, the man himself was nice enough to chat a bit and take pictures with anyone around.

Later that night, he was to perform at a free concert in downtown Melbourne for FITs homecoming. But not before three great acts got the crowd warmed up for him. FIT always does a great job hooking up these concerts every year, and this year was particularly packed with entertainment.

The first band up was Kash'd Out who play around Florida quite a bit. Recently they have been stretching out nationally and word has it they even picked up a tour with Pepper. Unfortunately, they had a lot of sound issues and even lost sound at one point. But it lead to a beautiful moment when they played acoustically and the crowd sang along with them.

Second up was a RDGLDGRN (Red, Gold, Green). For me, this band was a huge surprise and a big highlight of the night. When they started, they seemed to struggle a bit with the sparse crowd and lack of audience feedback, but within half of a song the crowd was quickly building and falling in love with these guys. Blending hip hop, rock, and of course reggae with catchy hooks and tight harmonies had this guy dancing his way closer to the stage.

Hirie was the last act before the main event and there was no lack of energy during her set. Hailing from Hawaii, Hirie has been making a splash in the reggae scene with her Gwen Setfani like stage presence and Ariana Grande like vocals. During Hirie's set the sky decided to open up and pour on everyone I attendance. Luckily, I had just stepped into Iron Oak Post to use the bathroom and didn't get soaked like everyone else. I wouldn't have minded though. I love rain at big concerts. To me it's like the ultimate equalizer. It doesn't matter who is wearing what, or how you did your hair. When the rain soaks everyone...we are all in the same boat and free to just let go and have fun.

Matiyahu finally took the stage as the rain settled down and charged it from go. Playing all his hits including "King Without a Crown," "One Day, Two," and "Two Child One Drop" to an ecstatic crowd. I noticed, during his set, that Matis (that's what his friends call him) has cooled out a bit over the years. His lightning speed lyrics have calmed some and there is a distinct infusion of irie soul happening there. I loved it, and so did the masses in attendance. Not deterred by the rain even a little bit, the crowd stayed with him and he delivered a very strong performance.

Thank you Florida Tech, once again, for a great time and for bringing acts of this caliber to our little corner.







The Harringtons

The Brevard music scene is a very tight knit community. People come and go, people meet and fall in love. You'd be hard pressed to find a better story of two people 'finding' each other and making beautiful music together. Meet the Harringtons.

"As long as I can remember music has always a part of my life," states Bonnie Harrington. 'I came from a musical family." The singer/songwriter/performer then nudges her talented husband, singer/songwriter/composer Andy Harrington to answer the question. "For me, it was when I was 15 and in my first band. I'd asked for a bass for my birthday. Dad bought me an Ibanez Roadstar II electric guitar instead," Andy chuckles. "I'm glad he did!"

The two seem almost inseparable now but did come from very different back rounds. Andy's first gigs were playing at the Outer Limits in Cocoa Village in the mid 90's with the metal band Alhazred and with the blues rock band at the Cocoa Village gazebo with Bad Mojo. For Bonnie "it was a production of Peter Pan with a children's community theater in Connecticut when I was 5 or 6. My mom is a singer, and it was exciting to me to get to do what she did. I remember sitting with her in the wings of the stage before my solo, and she was coaching me about how to command an audience, and I felt so happy and proud that she was sharing this with me and that I could be like her. And then I remember walking onto the stage, looking out at the crowd and seeing all their faces

and feeling a jolt of electricity and falling in love with it immediately." Quite the difference between the two's upbringing. Maybe it was those differences that brought them together.

In addition to the Harrington's performing in Brevard and the surrounding areas, they both focus on teaching. "I was lucky to be referred to FDM by the late Mark Benedix to fill in a teaching position for the tremendous Ron Ludwig," recalls Andy. "The position became permanent and I never looked back. For the guitar, so much can be self-taught for the player that has the desire and drive, but there comes a point where a teacher is needed to push the limits of the player and to work with their theory. Studying music theory is like studying any other language; you learn about the structure and the way things have been done before. Whether you follow suit or choose to smash those rules is up to the player and their creative intentions. Knowing the rules makes it much easier to break them." Bonnie's foray into teaching, at the same location, was less formal. "I was working behind the bar at Open Mike's, and Mike had inquiries from customers about voice lessons," she says. "He encouraged me to try out teaching." It suited her. Now with both working in the same place, it wasn't long until their paths crossed more often.

"We developed a friendship over the little exchanges we shared when I served him coffee," says Bonnie. Andy continues, "One day she walked out the back door where I was standing and said "pfft" in frustration, I said "psssht" in response." The two laugh like an old couple reliving their courtship. "I don't know when it became more, but one day it was different. He started sending me music he was working on. He went on tour and brought back fall leaves from NC for me. We quite literally just fell in love!" For Andy, their scheduled first date at a movie theater could have been anywhere." Our first date was to

get fish tacos and to see a movie. We found ourselves having such a great time together that we totally neglected seeing the movie and instead enjoyed each other's company."

The relationship blossomed and soon wedding plans were on the horizon. After about a year and a half of dating, Andy proposed. "She accepted my proposal in St Augustine after a Death Cab for Cutie show," recalls Andy. "We were near the Bridge of Lions. I was about to pop the question but there was this awful cover band audible from a bar about a block away and they were absolutely butchering Skynyrd's 'Simple Man'. After we got out of earshot of that and a little closer to the old Spanish fort, I proposed right by the river. Best question I ever asked, especially since she said yes!"

The wedding took place in Brevard and the Harringtons were established. Both have children from previous relationships; Bonnie a daughter named Abigail and Andy 2 sons ("they are both incredible young men who live with their mother and stepfather out of state."). Almost a year after the honeymoon, their son Apollo was born.

With both parents working, not to mention teaching music which has nontraditional hours, the schedule can be rough. "We alternate teaching so one of us can be home with the kids," Bonnie explains. "We weave practice time and writing time into nap time and after bedtime."

In addition to teaching both parents pursue a career of performing their own songs as well as entertaining in bar settings. Andy has a long history of original music in Brevard performing as part of The Ambivalents and most recently as Heliophonic. The music ideas couldn't be more different from each other. With the latter project he worked with Illuminated Paths; a visual artist that used projector screens at performances with looping images throughout the performance. The project helped Brevard develop the diversity that it would come to be known

for. Andy's creativity draws on her personal experiences; a military career early in life as well as a devastating fire that destroyed most of his belongings. "Sure. I served in the US Army from April '00 to October '04. I served in the 104th Military Intelligence Battalion within the 4th Infantry Division with some of the finest men and women I've ever met. We deployed to Iraq in early '03. "I forget which year the house fire happened, but it was quite a night. Sometime in the small hours of the morning I heard a bang from around back. I never did learn what the bang was but when I went back to investigate I saw the entire back porch area of the building was engulfed in flames. Everyone got out of the building ok; my refrigerator melted. Rockledge and Cocoa FD's were super-fast in arriving but most of the building was absolutely destroyed. All we could do was watch it burn while they fought the flames. Thanks to Brevard Music Aid and the Red Cross, I was on my feet quickly. Me being lazy that night my Strat and my Amp were still in my car parked up the street. "

These days life is good. Both participate in the local music scene with Bonnie recently performing in a songwriters' spotlight. Songwriter and friend Paul Roub has known the duo both individually and now together for years. "For starters, it's such a wonderful thing when two of your favorite people find each other," he says. "We felt like they both hit the jackpot. It's still true; just listen to Bonnie wax poetic about Andy's musical brilliance, or see the look on his face when Bonnie sings. And if you get to spend time around their toddler, you quickly learn that music is like air to him. Let him near a piano, or play a guitar in earshot and he's instantly happy. "

Both Andy and Bonnie Harrington revel in their good fortune, talent and faith. Andy is the band leader at Advent Lutheran Church in Suntree. "I love seeing growth in others and in



myself. Serving others through music," he answers when asked about his faith. "As a parent, the kids themselves are inspiring. Bonnie is a treasure of a person, being supportive of her is really a privilege. In music, I want to connect people to our shared human experience. I want to give people that moment where they realize that they aren't the only person who has felt the way they feel! I want to make people feel connected. "

Bonnie concludes the interview. "I've been drawn to music for as long as I can remember, I don't remember a time when I wasn't learning and performing," she proclaims. "It's a privilege to be able to make music and share it with people. Being an instructor has made me a better player. It all draws from the same creative pot so to speak. But I'm just looking at the music from different angles when I'm teaching vs. when I'm performing or writing. Teaching someone to play or sing forces me to really think about what I'm doing and why I'm doing it. And a big part of teaching is being a cheerleader for your students as they find their footing, and helping them to believe in themselves and their art even. My students inspire me to be brave, like they are, and to keep stepping out of my comfortable little bubble and push myself in new directions. As a parent, I want my kids to feel loved and secure so they can be themselves. I want them to know how to find beauty in the world. I want them to be whatever makes them happy. In a lot of ways, loving Andy comes very easily! He inspires me! And we have built a lot together, and tried to be partners in every way. I am proud of that! I guess the dream would be a band with Andy on guitar. I love performing with him so that would be pretty amazing!"



SPACE COAST MUSIC FESTIVAL IN HINDSIGHT

If you build it, they will come! Iconic words from the movie 'Fields of Dreams.' The question that I and my Space Coast Music Festival cohorts were thinking was "If you wrote it, would they come?"

Original music in Brevard County is never a sure hit. Found consistently in the pages of Brevard Live (thanks Heike) and WFIT (thanks Todd & crew), but will it work in EGAD? The overwhelming answer to that question was 'Yes' thanks to the many volunteers, bands and vendors and to YOU the faithful who came out on Saturday November 2 for a good cause. But how did we get here?

First, we took a damn good idea. The Space Coast Music Festival debuted in 2010. It ran for 5 years at various locations in the county. Original local bands, out of town bands, cover/jam bands. Tickets were sold and money was raised. Many a school benefited from the 5 years of existence. A failed attempt to bring it back in 2016, then 2017 left me bewildered.

A faithful night in my kitchen with Harbor City Local/SFG front man Steven Spencer changed everything. He had wanted to do a festival in EGAD for quite a while. He knew that all the elements were there. The final piece was a cause. We were to raise money to buy musical instruments for local schools. This was the same cause that the SCMF had championed some years ago. Suddenly the idea became a reality and all we had to do was pull it off! (Sarcasm)

Enter into the picture Keenun Barley. She runs *Plant Based Brevard* and is the chief organizer of FleagadMarket. A meeting was had where she suggested to Spencer that the festival be an extension on the November Fleagad event. In addition to the vendors selling their wares in Eau Gallie square, we would add some music.

A few bands, a few stages. Yeah right. What started out as 30 bands on 3 stages quickly escalated. A simple social media post inviting bands to sign up kept growing. More and more businesses signed on both as sponsors and participants. Wes and Lisa from Against The Grain Tattoo are real life Angels. Legit. Their enthusiasm powered the creation and implementation of just about everything people saw there. Standard Collective's Tony and Alaynna, the same thing. The amount of talented people who were willing to donate their time and make sacrifices for the good of the festival is staggering. The fact that we all had bands involved didn't hurt either.

The whole thing went from idea, to meetings to fruition on a matter of months. 30 bands turned to 50 turned to 60 turned to 68. The Pat Travers Band, featuring Brevard residents David Pastorius and Tommy Craig signed on. The vision was clear; to showcase local original talent at a free event, all the while raising money for music education. But would any come?

Hell yeah they did! Through the cooperation of print media, radio, social media and good old word of mouth, our event got traction. We even got the attention of Jimmy and Jacie Stivers! Plans came together along with artist Derek Gores to have a marketing campaign to bring Trader Joe's to Brevard. As of press time, the movement had met their goal of getting 20,000 likes

on Facebook and Instagram. Nothing would be sweeter than to fulfill this adventurous goal to bring a socially conscious company to a socially conscious community. Nothing that is except for the prize itself of donating musical instruments to kids in need.

Instruments For Schools

I, like many of my musician brethren, would not be who I am without music education in school. I was 8 years old when I started playing drums. After transferring school districts I was given access to a drum set and told to explore it (the new school was just starting kids out with the basics as I had 2 more years' experience than them). Every morning I would get to school early and bang on the drums. The trust they instilled in me is something that stays with me as an adult and really in most of the relationships I maintain to this day.

The reality is that many schools including Brevard have to cut arts programs. Through this festival experience, we have learned that many schools write grants for new instruments but only receive partial fulfillment. The SCMF is committed to provide as much of those missing instruments as possible. At press time the money we raised is still being calculated. Rest assured the money raised after expenses will be put to good use so that this generation and many more to come of musicians will benefit from our communities' generosity.

Highlights

There are many memories that stick out from the festival. The Musical Petting Zoo is one for sure. A carry over idea from the failed 2016/17 attempt, it was a success at this year's reboot. A big thank you to Love Hut and Groove Shack for that. As Spencer told me; "A highlight for me was the school jazz bands performing." Especially the kid wearing Corrosion of Conformity t-shirt! We successfully made the connection between music education in

schools and the thriving original music in Brevard. For one day at least we all existed as one.

Big props to whatever God you believe in for the amazing weather that day. I was glued to the ACCU-weather forecast in the days leading up that thought there would be a chance of showers. Turned out there was a sun shower, albeit very brief. It actually cooled the place down for a while without forcing anyone to leave due to bad weather.

Tony from Standard Collective sums it up; "It is an honor to be one of the organizers of such an amazing event. Never estimate the power of a few positive humans with lofty goals to change the minds and hearts of so many through music and community."

So what's next? There are talks at press time concerning a second edition next year. I'll also be working on an offshoot project; *Bang A Drum* for music education. People will be able to go online and bid on autographed drum heads and other memorabilia from music, sports and entertainment. All the proceeds go towards our cause to support music education in schools.

Homegrown

It is important to realize that these bands represented at the SCMF all live here. It was great that we all came together for the one day to enjoy and celebrate our music scene. Please keep in mind that music fans and new converts have the opportunity most every weekend to see these bands in the smaller clubs around town. There are a ton of bands here that for whatever reason did not perform. I implore everyone to keep the momentum going throughout these next 12 months to make our community even stronger. Make new art, make new music. Tell 3 more people. Become the Brevard County that I've been encouraging and writing about in these pages for the last 7 years. Everybody wins and our schools benefit in the process. Not a bad accomplishment to work towards, eh?











CD REVIEW







Iron Will Secrets

t's so refreshing to put a CD in the player and the music grabs you right from the get go! This month's review is for Iron Will and their EP, Secrets. It will be no secret that we will be hearing a lot of Iron Will in the future!

"Iron Will" is an Alternative Rock project from Central Florida that formed in 2019 inspired by the likes of Audioslave, Rage Against the Machine, and Thrice amongst others. It's the opinion of this reviewer, however, that Iron Will can cross over to many rock genres. Their debut single *Anthem* was released in June of 2019 where it gained instant accolades. *Anthem* took home the "Next Big Thing/Best Newcomer" award at IndieCon 2019, was recognized by WJRR NativeNoise and WFIT as one of the top releases of summer.

The concept for Iron Will was formed by William Walsh (song writer, guitars, and vocals) in November 2018.

After a brief stall with another band, through perseverance and continued writing and finalizing the song "Anthem," everything changed. William (Will) booked studio time at Rocky Water Studios. Quite the all star squad with Stu Richardson on Bass and Alex Petrovsky on drums! Production, mixing and mastering were done by Stu Richardson and Anthony Fata.

After going through the recording process Will knew it was time to recruit a live band. The live band is guitars, vocals by William Walsh, bass by Jeff Daughtridge, and Jamie Pannucci on drums.

If there was anything I'd ask more of, it would be nice to hear some more lead guitar on some of the tunes. But on the other hand all these tunes are killer! The vocals are lush and melodic. Will uses his voice as an instrument all on its own. Great range! The lyrics are a change. Every tune has a message lyrically. There's no darkness to them which seems to be so en vogue today. Each tune tells us that, yes, we all have our random failures but we can overcome. You have to get this CD and you'll hear what I mean.

All production, studio engineering and sound levels are perfect. Rhythm section (drums/bass) are as tight as can be. Guitar tone is spot on. I already mentioned the vocals!

The first song "Rooftops" has a cool intro when coming into the main vibe at 00:13. There's a nice change at 01:14 before coming back to the main theme. Love the octaver/synth guitar coming in at 01:20. Sweet bass run at 01:55. Great passage at 02:47 to 03:09.

"Rooftops" segues nicely into our second song "Innocuous." Love the transistor radio/telephone speaker audio effect in the intro. Will understands the importance of spot on harmonies. He kills it throughout. Check the vocal range at 02:30.

I can understand why "Anthem" received so many accolades. I can't explain how cool this tune is playing in my 700hp hot rod with the win-

dows down and 600 watts! Going the speed limit, of course! This tune has a Red Hot Chili Peppers vibe rhythmically. But any comparisons stop there. Stu Richardson (bass) Alex Petrovsky (drums) are monster players here! They interpret William Walsh's song writing excellently here. Nice short drum intro. Another cool guitar synth at 00:50. At 02:42 we have the octave/ fuzz lead which just melts! I may have to look into this...it's a way cool effect.... There's a cool change back to verse at 03:07 which is seamless. The drums and bass kick into another gear at 03:44 during the outro. I think "Anthem" is deserving of national attention.

Last tune on the EP is "Ground Zero". Epic tune; Epic intro! Reminds me of those great Styx intros. Yes, that Styx. This would be a great arena rock tune from that era. I think it crosses generations and genres to fit well with anything out there in the present.

You will not be disappointed with "Iron Will." William Walsh has the knack for writing incredible tunes. I only wish this album was longer but it bodes well for things to come! Purchase this EP. You will enjoy it!

COMPUTER GAME RETRO

Pemember when computer games were new and relatively simple? Young people would flock to arcades to spend an afternoon playing on several screens while others enjoyed an old-fashioned match of table foosball along with pool billiard. These were the 80s, and the beginning of the computer age, still fairly innocent but exciting and long before cyber attacks, dark net or internet scams. People like to remember the "good old days" - mainly because they were much younger 40 years ago. The millennial and Gen Z were not around, and they are the ones who discover the magical 80s all over again. A memory for Gen X, an adventure for Gen Z! At Rubix Cafe & Games you can have both, and the fun is FREE!

Richard Hendry is the visionary of this adventure into the computer past. Are you surprised? Not if you know the man, founder and promoter of "80s In The Park" that was held in 2013 for the first time at Wickham Park featuring a great line-up of popular 80s bands. Five more festivals followed despite of many mishaps along the way but 2018 saw the last one. "I'm all done with it," says Hendry who's actually writing a book about his festival experiences. He's a seasoned entrepreneur who has worked as contractor, in car sales, radio, managed flea and farmer markets, owned a restaurant, and many more jobs. "I keep changing," he says. For the past decade he's been the operation manager at Nature's Market at 701 South Apollo Blvd. in Melbourne. "Ten years ago we were the largest individually owned health food store in town," he remembers. That was before the bigger chains moved in and the internet was offering the same products at discounted prices. By 2016 business started to decline, and "we had to think about changing strategy." The cafe part of the store where Richard's wife has been in charge of preparing tasty and healthy meals for lunch and dinner as "Lucy In The Kitchen" was still doing well. The supplements have a decent shelf live, and the store had still a loyal customer base, mostly older people who received their senior discounts, "but the grocery section had to go," explains Richard. That was a third of the store, and "we had to do something to attract customers preferably younger people." Being a fan of the 80s, Richard was quite aware about the retro trend, so he wanted to create "a flash back" - "somewhere between Chucky Cheese and Dave and Busters," says Richard. The major difference between the new Rubix Cafe and all the other retro stores: there is no entry fee and you can play all the games for free. The concept works. "Folks of all age groups hang out for hours. We have

lots of parties, and everyone has fun," explains Richard

So what do you find at Rubix? Of course, you can play Pac Man, one of the oldest and most popular video games released to a mesmerized generation in 1980. There are about 100 more games to explore among them the popular Call Of Duty, a war game based on WWII and released in 2003. You can play foosball, darts, pool, air hockey, and there is a 25 square foot lego table.

Refreshments, snacks and home-cooked meals are available all day along with a selection of wine and several craft beers. "Of course, we will always carry Budweiser, Stella and the top ten popular beers," says Richard. "But I am scouting out about 100 different craft beers that I want to bring in for people to buy or consume here." Since all that craft beer cannot be kept refrigerated, Richard plans to get a so-called jet-cooler that cools any beverage in a couple minutes. "Rubix will become a destination for craft beer lovers," says Richard. In October they added Rockstar Karaoke with Charles & Lissa Knight every Tuesday starting at 7 pm.

Rubix has been open since August but it's still a work in progress. New signs are coming soon, and Richard is working on getting a "blues mobile." In the meanwhile there is an old decorated 1986 Cadillac El Dorado hearse standing in the parking lot attracting attention. "It actually still runs," smiles Henry, "but the driver side door won't open. I have a video driving it around in our parking lot."

The biggest party at Rubix will be on New Year's Eve with a Rocking VIP Evening featuring hard rock singer and guitarist John Corabi. He was the frontman of The Scream during 1989. He was also the frontman of Mötley Crüe between 1994 and 1996 during original frontman



Vince Neil's hiatus from the band. The party starts at 9 pm and ends at 2 am. The admission cost \$49 per person and \$90 per couple and includes a snack buffet, a bottle of wine or champagne, midnight toast, a continental breakfast and party favors. ROCK YOUR HEALTH

Buyer's Remorse, Fear and other useless things

ith the holidays coming in like a bear, I often find myself thinking about the things we do to undermine our good times. Last month I talked about the expectations we have and how we need to control them. As I was thinking about this month, a term kept finding its way into my wildly cluttered mind. Buyer's Remorse. Wow, a real term that exists only because of the insane way we think about things. Where does this come from? I can think of nothing worse then buying a gift or getting one that has attached to it in some way remorse! I know I'll enjoy giving or receiving that gift! Nothing makes a holiday brighter than regret!

What that says about us as a culture would take (and has taken) volumes to unpack. It is best described as Approach-Avoidance Conflict. There are two things at play, two systems in the brain. The Approach Motivation system and the Avoidance Motivation system. Simply put, one draws us to a thing for gratification and the other pushes us away based on the possibility of a negative outcome. The distinction between approach and avoidance motivation has been discussed by scholars for millennia, beginning with the ethical hedonism espoused by the ancient Greek philosophers Democritus (460-370 B.C.) and Aristippus (430–360 B.C.). This is most notable in major purchases like a car or home but for some wild reason – it even finds its way into buying small things too. We want a thing but fear what will come from getting the thing. And that is a lot of crap to put ourselves through in the

check out line at Five Below!!

The idea that we would have these kind of feelings from giving is hard to understand. Frankly, it makes us sound crazy. But that is what fear does, makes us crazy. Fear that it is too much or not enough or the wrong thing or that the person will not like it. It's a roller coaster ride. One that point us in a direction that is a downward spiral. And that ride is hard to get off of. How we move so quickly from generosity to remorse is amazing. Some people report the remorse coming in before they get to the car with the boxes. And all because of fear.

In the simplest terms Fear Kills Fun! It takes away the enjoyment of life, keeps us from living the lives we dreamed of and worse than that - it makes our lives small.

Keeps us in the same little box all the time. Trying nothing new. Risking nothing. Never allowing us the possibility for growth or change. This is quickly followed by regret and that is not only the death blow to a good time. It can become the defining walls that keep us locked in the past.

These types of feeling cause a cascade of adrenaline and other hormones that hurt us. Confuse us and leave us with far less than what we wanted. Fear is the fun killer, the life killer! And what remains from these fears, the regrets, stay with us. Now, I have not hung around the hospital enough to know this for sure but, it's a safe bet that people dying have never said "I'm glad I never did the things I wanted to do."

So how do handle fear? Should we have no fear? No, I mean anyone that tells you that they have no fear – you should not let them drive your car. But, having less fear or fearing the right things can be a good thing. Fear has helped us to defend ourselves, driven us to fix problems and can be a good companion throughout our lives if we use it wisely and keep it in check.

Experts say that we should make a budget and stick to it. That we should consider the value and usefulness of a thing rather than its cost. They say a lot of things but in the end, it is all about priorities.

Prioritizing Fear!

With that said, how important is it to fear giving? Should it be on your list of fears? If it were to make it on anyone's list, it should be so low that you would need to scroll down for hours to find it.

Giving should be a thing that makes us feel great. To others and to ourselves. Especially if it is to ourselves! In fact, how we feel about giving things to others and the way we treat ourselves is directly linked. If we are constantly denying ourselves the things we want, ignoring what we need and feel undeserving – we will have trouble with the act of giving. And we will never have the right feelings about either. I can think of nothing sadder then living that way. But, again, that's what this type of useless fear does.

And how completely useless is remorse? Sure in the right context, remorse is a tool that helps us to learn and avoid making the same mistakes but, allowing it to be part of the giving process is to say that we are sorry for giving. That we regret joy or generosity.

Go back to the death bed and imagine someone saying that they "are happy they regretted giving to themselves and others!" These useless things are much like what Shakespeare said about jealousy "[they] Mock the meat they feed on".


I much prefer the old sayings that – "we should give with a good heart" and "it's better to give than receive."

Graphic Artist And Friend To Many

Ronald Strantz aka BARFLY

Although you may not recognize the name Ronald Strantz, you've seen his work, some in this very magazine in fact. Graphic art is something we all take for granted; from music videos to store logos, to advertisements in Brevard Live. Strantz, or perhaps better known as Barfly, makes creations that stay in your head all the way to the concert or the "Ladies Night" you're attending.

"I'm from Escondido, San Diego, California. I moved here during the summer before 6th grade and lived in Satellite Beach," he explains of his upbringing. "I went to Satellite High School." His father also an artist owned *Cool Runnings*, a reggae apparel business. "Not only did he make cool stuff for a lot of major musicians, he also supplied all the local surf shops with t-shirts and surfboard laminates: RC's, Natural Art and Quiet Flight." Soon the younger Strantz started to follow in his dad's footsteps. "I think I got the design bug from him. To be honest he's way more talented than I am."

Strantz (close friends call him RJ) got into graphic design from a friend in art school in 2007. "I was hoping to be a photographer," he says. "I would take landscapes and portraits and then edit them in Photoshop. I would play around with portraits of friends making them into animals and robots and such. I found that I was better at Photoshop than I

was at photography." A close friend, artist Casey DeCotis, became his sidekick and mentor. "Casey once said 'There are a million pretty pictures, ya gotta find your own niche'." With that in mind, the team would consist of DeCotis shooting the pictures and Strantz doing the editing." Photographs would prove to be a labor of love that didn't necessarily pay the bills. Strantz still had much creativity to spare to move into the field of advertising.

"I've been in the bar business for as long as I can remember," he continues. "I would create a flyer or something for an event and it seemed to get attention. Using my knowledge of that industry I wouldn't be afraid to try new things." His talents got noticed. "All of sudden people started asking me for things. Barfly was born! I now have a good team of people that can pretty much provide anything you need." He can draw upon his family's history to satisfy his client's needs. "When someone wants to start a business and they need a logo I offer them the full package," he states. "A logo, business cards, flyer, social media ads and set up, and clothing design at a deal you won't get anywhere else. You are able to come out of the gate swinging! It's really cool when you see your art help someone start down a path of success. Knowing you helped that happen for them and their family is really an amazing feeling."

One of Brevard's strengths is the mutual admiration that exists here of the creative community. Barfly is no exception. "My buddy Chris Maslow, an amazing painter, does things with a paint brush that I could never do. His work is all around town and it's inspiring to me because he cares about what he creates and you can see that." Maslow himself reciprocates. "He excels at everything he pursues. Whether it be graphic design, playing guitar, mixology, or working on motorcycles. The creativity runs in his family, and family is something he holds sacred. He's an excellent father and a hard worker. He never stops working toward his goals and always gives more than is expected of him. He is authentic and original, a true artist."

Barfly is riding high with his business but remains grounded in his happiness. "I'm currently feeling pretty blessed," he exclaims. "I've lived all over the world. I moved away after high school and lived in Seattle for few years. I moved overseas to Greece for a while and traveled all over Europe. I arrived in Greece with a back pack a guitar and 300 bucks. I ended up living there for years. After that I came back here and starting raising a family. Funny how ten years can fly by but I know this is home. I'm two blocks from my pops and my closest friends are here so this is home. Of course, I would like to not worry about money but it's part of what makes me hungry. I really enjoy what I do. I would like to make something one day that lasts; something meaningful, something important. When I find the time to play and make things just for fun, I try to create something that you would want to hang in your home or business. But it would be great if I can someday make something that inspires others. I think my dream job would be making movie covers for big movies or working for a music label designing album covers and such. Like I said, I'm happy to just be an artist that people rely on daily to create for them.

Offering words of wisdom in closing, he again is wise beyond his years. "I would say be patient. Be different! There are loads of graphic artists most probably younger and better than you. I would say don't be afraid to stand out. Help others along the way and learn from each other. Stay current with your craft. Computer programs are changing and growing daily but you're an artist first. You got to educate yourself on what's new and grow your own pallet. My motto is under-promise over-deliver."

Rigg's Outpost FISHING REPORT FOR DECEMBER

December fishing in Brevard is explosive! The sea temps drop and a flood of northern fish seek their Winter refuge. This phenomenon brings locals and tourists out from colder climates to partake in this experience. Weather will dictate offshore fishing this month. The rough northeasters will trigger the spectacular sailfish cut the heavy chop seeking big live baits.

From Canaveral Inlet to Sebastian Inlet the surf and jetty fishing will be crazy... The beaches from Cocoa thru Sebastian Inlet will have pods of bait being attacked by toothy predators. The Spanish mackeral will chase glass minnows to the beach on the mild west winds. Simply a light spinning rod and a 2 to 3 ou, spoon will hookup every cast when their on. Traverse the numerous beaches until you find finger mullet and you will locate the voracious bluefish. If their not visually on top throw a chunk of mullet out there and the ROD WILL BEND!!!

I have Beach Chartered for 10 years on a safari that consumes my every bone.. Pompano and Permit fishing.. Please note that I capitalize the spelling!!! These are the true delicacies in the surf. These silver tourists are arriving from N. Carolina and are hungry. It's certainly a necessity to use a 10 to 12 ft. rod to cast from 60 to 100 yards. Terminal tackle must include Fluorocarbon pompano leaders armed with attractive floats and sharp circle hooks. Weighted with 4 to 5 ounce pyramid sinkers or sputnik sinkers for windier days. Baits of choice are sand fleas, salted clams and brined shrimp. Don't forget sand spikes. Always bring a very light rod with a whiting rig. Cast 20 feet past the break with shrimp and put some tasty whiting in the cooler. Oh my goodness. I'm about to throw the rods in the Tundra and roll.... Canaveral Inlet has a wonderful public jetty to fish on. There is virtually no tidal flow so fishing is easy. Casting an ultra lite combo with a pompano jig and quill is very productive. Drifting live shrimp will spark the flounder to leave the bottom. Sebastian Inlet is the kingpin for big bull redfish from jetty and interior rock piles at the State Park. The \$4.00 entry fee is so worth it. This pristine parcel provides ocean, inlet and river fishing all in one! If your in the area for a while spend part of the day studying the anglers. What fishing tackle they use and which bait. Basically live mud minnows or mullet for the redfish and fiddler crabs for the tasty sheepshead..I wish all of you a tremendous holiday and Tightlines in Brevard County this visit!!!!






