SC Music Festival Drew Large Crowd

Not only did the rain stop but the sun came out to shine upon the 2021 Space Coast Music Festival held last month in the Eau Gallie Arts District. An estimated crowd of over 5000 watched 80 plus bands on 6 1/2 stages, bought from local vendors and as a new addition to the festival; marveled at a bmx bike exhibition.

The Kid's Zone was expanded from the 2019 edition, adding pace painting and a characture artist to the mix. The Love Hut continued it's mission to educate and entertain with The Musical Petting Zoo; an interactive area where kids are encouraged to learn about and play various hand held instruments. Some of the festival highlights included performances by local junior and senior high school bands as well as Groove Shack students rocking out next to the Against The Grain main stage. Kristen Warren & Her All Star Band closed things out in front of hundreds who stayed even though the fall temperatures dropped into the night.

On stage, the temperatures soared as Warren, her backing band Creed and a trio of backup singers saw special guests horn player Chief Cherry, rappers Chez Quan and Wisney Fernandez and The Spring's guitarist Tomas Lopez joined in on the fun.

Total money raised were unavailable at press time but were expected to exceed 2019's amount. Plans are already being put into place for 2022. "Thank you to everyone; volunteers, bands, sponsors, vendors, media that helped make round 2 of the Space Coast Music Festival another positive experience," remarked Steven Spencer, founder of Harbor City Local and SCMF co-organizer. Many great memories were made on that day, with many more expected in the years to come.

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5th Annual New Year's Eve Street Party in Downtown Melbourne

THOMPSON SQUARE

The Hurricane Creek Saloon has presented a few memorable country concerts as street parties, and the owners are doing it again on New Year's Eve, closing Vernon Street (which is next to the saloon). Opening act is The Last Call Band that takes the stage at 8:30 pm, followed by multi-platinum selling, Grammy nominated country duo Thompson Square at 10:30 pm. This is a FREE concert. Inside HCS country DJ Jimmy Mixx will spin records; there will be party favors, and NYE countdown - just everything you need to welcome 2022.

Brought together by love and undeniable talent, Keifer and Shawna each moved to Nashville separately in the early 2000s, but soon met while competing against one another in a local singing competition. They formed Thompson Square as complete unknowns, taking the Country scene by storm with an organic vocal blend that harkened back to the duets of icons like Johnny Cash and June Carter.

For years they rode a wave of success rising from their Grammy-nominated, double-platinum breakout "Are You Gonna Kiss Me Or Not," traveling the world with superstars Jason Aldean

and Lady Antebellum and racking up Country-radio favorites like the devoted "I Got You" (Top 10 in 2011) and the flirty "Everything I Shouldn't Be Thinking About" (Top 5 in 2013).

But after 17 years of marriage and the birth of their first child in 2016 – a son named Rigney Cooper – their priorities have realigned, and they've started chasing another dream. Parting ways with their former record label on good terms, the duo were set free to create a project with the help of top-shelf producers Nathan Chapman (Taylor Swift) and Dann Huff (Keith Urban), but without the diluting influ-

ence of any Music Row machinery.

What emerged truly is their *Masterpiece*, an album filled with all the passionate potency Thompson Square is known for, plus a fearless new range of sounds and personality. Pristine Country balladry is joined by sandy reggae funk, fire breathing arena rock and sensual R&B, as the duo strives to be honest with each song's creative genesis. The album was released in 2018 and is available on i-Tunes.

Brevard Live Magazine interviewed Keifer Thompson last month.

In the early 2000 you and Shawna met at a country music competition in Nashville. What was the instant connection?

KT: The connection can only be explained as fate. I walked in and we saw each other and the connection was instant

When did you sign your first record deal?

KT: We signed with Stoney Creek Records in 2010.

You recorded a platinum selling, Grammy nominated song with "Are You Gonna Kiss Me Or Not" in 2011 along with several other radio favorites. You toured with superstars. How did you manage your relationship with the over-night success?

KT: Well, if overnight means 13 years of trying, then yes we were. Honestly we were together so long before and were so anchored it's never been a problem. We have normal married couple issues but we have no doubt that God put us together. We married the right one for sure and we're very blessed to not have issues in our partnership in music.

And just to be clear we didn't write "Are you gonna kiss me or not." That was written by David Lee Murphy and Jim Collins.

In 2016 your life and career changed. You and Shawna had a son and you left the record label to get on your own. Tell us about this decision.

KT: When we decided to have a child it really changed our perspective on life in general. We wanted to be able to enjoy him as much as possible, but honestly we left the label because our time there was no longer productive and we felt a big shift in the partnership and knew we needed to get out and do something else.

Then you produced your third CD "Masterpiece" released in 2018. Why is this your Masterpiece?

KT: I wouldn't consider it a masterpiece but the title track is about our son and came from such an honest place I would consider that to be my own personal masterpiece. I don't think I'll ever write another song that means that much to me

Thompson Square has its own sound because you and Shawna are songwriters. Do you write all your songs?

KT: We write most of our own material but we're always open to a great outside song. It has served us well in the past. We wouldn't have 'Are you gonna kiss me or not'.

You are back on tour. Do you take your son along? Is road-life more difficult since the pandemic?

KT: Cooper goes with us whenever possible. It's a little harder since he started school but we do everything we can not be away from him. Touring is a bit harder lately but because there's a shortage of busses and drivers and all the mandates have made it harder to just play shows but it's starting to loosen up.







As new parents and a newly Thompindependent duo. son Square have undoubtedly stepped into the next chapter of their Country-music fairytale ... one which Masterpiece documents in unedited clarity. They've scored the hits and won the awards – and they'd be happy to do it all again – but for the first time in their career, there's nothing holding their creativity back. Luckily, they've never been more ready to share it with fans.

"It's really one of the most liberating experiences we've had in our career," Keifer admits. "It's an exciting time, because if we can really do this record justice, we're gonna have that one-on-one relationship with the fans — and that's what it really should be all about in the first place."

THE SURFING SANTAS

"Last year we did not have a live event due to Covid. BUT 2021 should be our biggest event yet," says Surfing Santas organizer George Trosset who started this tradition somewhat by accident 13 years ago. He adds: "We could top 1,000 Surfing Santas and our spectators could exceed 10,000!"

The first, very unofficial Surfing Santas event took place in 2009, when, on Christmas Eve, Trosset and his son, George Jr., and daughter-in-law Britteny thought it would be fun to go surfing in South Cocoa Beach dressed up as Santa Claus and his elves. When a photo of their antics hit the front page of a Florida newspaper, others wanted to join the fun. Since then, the number of Surfing Santas has grown almost exponentially each year.

This is an event any Tourism Office can dream about. 13 years later it

is the biggest tourist attraction since NASA's space and shuttle program. Then, five years ago, The Surfing Santas became viral news with 1.8 Billion impressions. By now it has become a global phenomenon.

Since anyone of any age can participate as a Surfing Santa, exactly how many Santas will descend on Cocoa Beach this December 24th remains to be seen. The only requirement is to show up with your board and dressed as Santa or his helpers or any other character depicting the spirit of the season. In the

past, there also have been reindeer and Christmas tree Surfing Santas, Rastafarian Surfing Santas, and even a Batman Surfing Santa. There are no rules about costumes, organizers point out, as long as one remembers this is a family oriented event. A costume contest open to the public has been

added in 2017. Anyone in the crowd can participate by dressing up in a winter-themed outfit.

All this beachy holiday merriment is for a good cause. Proceeds from donations and sales of the official Surfing Santas T-shirt commemorating this free event benefit two local nonprofit organizations, *Grind for Life* and the *Florida Surf Museum*. "Our new t-shirt design has become a big hit with the space themed Surfing Santa," says Trosset. "This year we have a Surfing

Santa Astronaut in a SpaceX astro-

naut suit! Pretty cool!" (See graphic)

The event begins at 8 am along the beach near 2 Minutemen Causeway (where the causeway intersects with N. Atlantic Avenue, also known as Florida Route A1A) and is expected to con-

tinue until early afternoon. Plenty of parking is available and numerous area restaurants will be open to serve Surfing Santas participants and spectators.

There is always live music. "Our entertainment includes The Harbor City Trio, Hawaiian dancers and the Costume Contest," says Trosset.

A Peter White Christmas



I play a Gretsch electromatic through a hot rod deluxe with a couple pedals in between." Driving Me Crazy!

 \mathbf{F} or a million and one reasons that when combined all add up to dumb luck I found myself between jobs a few months ago. In the last year I've had a lot to handle between wrapping up nearly 9 years of schooling, a wide variety of health issues to navigate and balancing a career to boot. So, when I got one morning and realized I had nowhere to go I decided to take the opportunity for a break of sorts and find a way to get by doing something with very little responsibility for a minute. I kept hearing others talk about the uptick in contract delivery jobs since the pandemic began. Apparently quite a bit of the work force had taken to driving people, dinner and groceries around in the absence availability of traditional jobs. It sounds good on paper. You make your own hours, work in your own environment and your boss is literally an app on your phone—doesn't sound so bad right? I kid you not my friends, I heard many stories of drivers making upwards of a grand a week doing this. Not only that...it seemed a perk that you can travel and perform these jobs anywhere in the country at any time. With all of this amazing information I put my career on a short hold and started signing up to drive for a living. Here's what happened.

The following company names have been changed for obvious rea-

sons...they have better lawyers than we do.

The first company I signed up with is called Instafart (not really) and they pay people to go grocery shopping for their customers and then deliver them to their homes. This service became super popular during quarantine when nobody wanted to go out shopping. As a customer you simply go online or on an app and order everything you want from a store. A "shopper", as they're known, then accepts your order on their smart phone and goes shopping for you. Everything, including a tip, is already paid for by the customer through the app and the shopper simply swipes a special card at checkout before delivering your goods to your door.

Everyone said this one was the best and I would make so much money just working a few hours a day. What? Some people are just crazy. I signed up and jumped through all the onboarding hoops. Once I was ready to shop I turned on the app and waited. After about 30 minutes I had a bite and an order popped up. You have a very short time to claim an order before someone else grabs it so I hit the button as quickly as I could without even looking at the store or how big the order was...big mistake newbie! After two hours of shopping, my initial order of 56 items had turned into 71. You may be aware that there are shortages of just about everything right now. Nearly half of what the customer ordered was out of stock and I had to keep texting them to get a replacement. On top of that they decided to keep adding things on since I was "conveniently" still in the store. After checking out I realized that this was a "shop only" order as well. This meant that I was only shopping and leaving the groceries there for someone else to pick up. No delivery, and no tip. My first experiment into this new career had cost me just over two hours of my time and netted me \$13.00-- minus gas to the store and

back. That's about \$6.00 an hour folks or minimum wage...in the late 80's.

My next move was going to be delivering people either by driving for Super or Rift (again, fake names). These are the first generation of contract delivery and seem to have passed the test of time. They have taken over the car service market pretty much everywhere and still have drivers working for them, so I jumped in and started signing up. To be honest I was a little wary about doing this. I had opted to start with groceries because they don't talk to you or complain about the air temp, but it was beginning to look like this was where the money was. In the end I had to abandon that path anyway. Apparently there were too many drivers in the area and I was put on an indefinite waiting list. I'm still on it. But that just goes to show how many people have turned to alternative ways of making money in the current state of the world. Moving on...

My final experiment turned me back to food delivery, only this time I would not be delivering groceries. This time I would instead be delivering hot, ready to eat food from restaurants to customers with a company called Light Pod (rhymes with a real company, but not real). Just like all the other companies Light Pod is run by an app...I honestly don't know if there are any real people even involved. Through the app customers order a meal or six from any of the restaurants available and pay for it. A driver then gets the order, picks it up from the chosen restaurant and delivers to the customer's door. The drivers are paid a delivery fee of about \$1.50 plus a tip left by the customer. This is the one I did the most so let me tell you all about it.

Right of the bat I ran into my first problem- - my car. I drive a full size SUV with a V8. I get about 9 miles to the gallon. I realized very quickly that I was spending at least as much in gas as I was making with Light Pod, maybe even more, meaning I was potentially losing money. Normally I would have quit at this point, but by now my bank account was running on fumes and I didn't have a lot of options left. I had to figure out how to make this one work until I could find another job in my field. Luckily, I know someone with a tiny 3 cylinder car that can run for a week on 10 bucks worth of gas and they agreed to switch cars with me while I was working. With that worked out I was back on the road and hopefully headed towards the black.

With any new job there will be a learning curve and it was no different this time. My first mistake became evident very quickly when I decided it was probably a good idea to take every order that popped up regardless of where the pick-up was located. Suddenly I found myself on trips 20 to 30 minutes away to pick-up the orders that usually take another 15 to 20 minutes to deliver. Most orders only pay 6 or 7 dollars which means I was again making 1980's wages. In addition I had to learn which restaurants were commonly late on having the orders ready. In the beginning I would have to sit and wait another 10 to 15 minutes for the orders which meant even less time to make money. Then, after you finally get the food where it needs to go, you may have to answer to a customer who wants to know "what took so long?" That just kills me every time. I actually kind of liked this job and wouldn't mind doing it more often if the pay was better, but for others it may be worth it. By the way, for you customers that want to know why your food takes so long I might be able to help you out. Check out my tips below.

Matt Tips to Get Your Delivery Food Faster!

- 1. Don't order your food at peak hours, especially on weekend nights. Restaurants don't seem to understand that every minute delivery drivers are sitting around waiting they are losing money and very commonly take orders they obviously can't get out on time.
- 2. Check the locations of restaurants you are ordering from. I can't tell you how many times I would pick up BBQ or sushi 30 minutes away from the customers house and pass 2 or 3 BBQ or sushi restaurants on the way to deliver their food.
- 3. Watch your phone for texts or calls. If I can't find your house or need a code to the front gate I may need to contact you, and when you don't answer, I have to sit and wait for you to call dispatch wondering where your food is.
- 4. Leave a friggin' front light on. Addresses are not always easy to see and if you don't at least leave a light for me, I have almost no chance of finding your house.
- 5. Leave a decent tip. This last one won't make your food appear any faster, but it's the right thing to do. The compacontinued next page

The Jupiter Effect
Vintage Reel

This is the best time of the year for me. Festive, cooler weather, hanging out with family and friends, eating to much good food etc. It's also a great time to review a great CD! Never ceases to amaze me how many talented artists we have in area. No exception this month! The Jupiter Effect with their CD Vintage Reel.

The Jupiter Effect was formed in early 2020. It came about through music composer Michael Mangaroo's effort to create a "real band" feel for the newly release mini EP entitled Vintage

Reel. The song composition was a joint effort between Mangaroo and lyricist Corey Kipps. Michael has a wide palate of genres in his repertoire. Vintage Reel has overtones of rock, blues, pop, Latin, jazz and classical.

The Jupiter Effect recently performed a 1-hour online show via social media on Get Amped XStream. They are planning to have an official EP release show soon. Band members are Corey Kipps (Vocals & Lyrics); Micheal Anthony Mangaroo (Guitars); David Pastorius (Bass on Wonderland); Jimmy Seay (Bass); Daniel Tenbusch (Keys); Ashton Bailey-Guild (Drums); Brendon Keith Paredes (Percussion); Chris Morgan (Double Bass & Cello). Horn section on the tune "Wonderland" are Deandre Lettsome (sax); Paul Jackson (trumpet); and Bismark Habyarimana (trombone). All songs written and composed by Michael Mangaroo. Production and Mastering by Brendon Paredes at Studio 101. Melbourne Florida.

Vintage Reel begins with the tune "Wonderland." Nice acoustical guitar intro until the 00:20 mark. Cool background accent lick at 00:29. A well written segue into a well planned Latin feel interlude. David Pastorius' bass runs and phrases are slick as hell. The horn section is perfect throughout. At 03:26, a very smooth technical lead takes the song to its outro. Great tune. A lot going on. Great composistion.

Next we have "One in a Million." Maybe my favorite on the EP. Guitar gets some funky wah wah in at 00:39.

Nice double guitar harmonies at 01:01. Strong but tasteful wah wah lead at 02:06 that doesn't quack at you but is used as it should be, embellish the solo. Keyboard parts perfect. Outro at 02:58 that flows right into the third tune on the CD "If The Moon Ever Smiled." It begins with a Babe I'm Gonna Leave you Led Zep feel (which I love) but the similarities end there. This has a beautiful ballad type of feel with classical overtones everywhere. The Keys/Piano parts are excellent.

"I'm Dreaming," song four, is definitely movie soundtrack material. An excellent cruising in my hot rod, sing along song. Great songwriting and musicianship. Bass and drums are as solid as can be. Music and lyrics come in right on the one at the beginning. Well timed echo vocals at 00:40, more great guitar backing at 01:32. Yet another well played guitar solo at 01:59. Michael Mangaroo is a very accomplished guitarist. The guitar outro brings visions of Edge from U2 fame. Lastly we have "Knocking On Your Door." A wonderful minor blues instrumental with Latin overtones. The band really smokes on this tune. Tasteful guitar soloing throughout, and at 04:20 I swear I hear a Richie Kotzen guitar run in the solo!

The Jupiter Effect is one solid band. Lyrics (vocals) and music (songwriting) is as good as or better than anything I've ever heard.



nies aren't paying the drivers much and they are really relying on your tips. You are already paying ridiculous prices to have your food delivered so another dollar or two shouldn't matter too much.

That was my foray into the world of contract delivery driving. In the end it had its ups and downs, just like anything else, and once I got the hang of it, it seemed to be what you make of it. That last sentence is a little confusing...let me try again. What I discovered is that if you want to work one

of these jobs you have to treat as just that - a job. There is no such thing as easy money for most of us, and if you work hard at just about anything, you can make it viable. That's all. The main thing that sets these jobs apart of course is the flexibility in hours. Work when you want as long as you want. Just remember that if you don't work, you don't make money. I would highly recommend this as a part time gig for extra bucks, but it's kind of scary to use it as your main thing...just my opinion. Cheers 'til next month, and drive safely!









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The Nation's Leader in Contemporary Tiki Carvings

ED'S HEADS

Tikis are forever! So says Ed Volonnino, founder and owner of ED's Heads. Even a world wide pandemic couldn't stop the public's demand for the wooden statues (Ed prefers to use dead cabbage or sable palms as a canvas). Carving now for 44 years, he shows no signs of slowing down. "I am the leader of this Tiki empire", he jokes, adding "Tikis never go out of style."

He is not a stranger to *Brevard Live*. We featured him in 2018, before lockdowns and people sheltering in place, rarely going out if they went out at all. "I was shocked that people were still interested in my business during this time. During the last year and a half, I've been busy," he explains. "People still got on the computer, couples would still come in person wearing masks and buy tikis."

Throughout his career he has seen it all. From setting up

residency at local restaurants and carving in front of crowds, to being featured on TV (HGTV) and in books about self taught Florida artists, he was and is always ready to share his gift. One thing that you won't find much of are custom jobs. "I'm not fond of doing a statue of your dog or create a family tree totem pole," he continues. "Chances are it isn't going to look like them anyway. The best jobs are when someone trusts me enough to create something from my imagination."

Make no mistake, Ed considers himself a performance artist. From doing live carving demonstrations at school assemblies, to singing Bob Dylan on stage with aptly titled Tree Frogs, to last month's Artworks festival in the Eau Gallie Arts District, he seemingly can do it all. The demonstrations are a particular treat as it is somewhat rare to see an artist create something from start to finish. Which begs the question; how long does it take to create a tiki? "A lot of people ask me that question," he responds. "The answer is that there really isn't any time limit. I may work for a few hours straight and then take a 20 minute break. It takes as long as it is going to until it is done."

He sticks to his convictions about his creations. He ages his palms up to a year and a half before he works on them, propping them off the ground on 2x4s. Similar to a wine collection, they get better with age. He also doesn't use power tools, other than a chain saw to cut them into the proper length. "Other tiki artists do, I guess, and that's fine, to each their own," he says. "I'm old school since I've never used anything but my carving tools." He also doesn't take many breaks in his workload. "I'm constantly creating. I carve every day." The fruits of his labor can be found on his website along with a more recent addition to his artwork - paintings.

"I started painting in 2008", he describes albeit somewhat out of necessity. He was lifting a log over a railing with one hand and pulled muscles in his forearm. Forced to take it easy for several months so it would heal, he switched gears to painting. Bright colors, abstract shapes and his signature faces kept him active while showcasing a different medium for people to enjoy and buy.

While speaking with him, Ed reminisces about his clients and experiences. His involvement with renowned musicians Leon Russell is well documented. Ed was a dj at Brassy's in Cocoa Beach and gave Russell and his manager a Tiki to put on stage. This led to a commissioned piece which graced the cover of his album 'Solid State'. What you might not know is that is was Russell's idea to paint the tiki. From that point forward ED's Heads Tiki would be painted, adding yet another unique feature to the already popular business.

"Do you want to hear something I find interesting?," he asks. The passion for his craft is contagious so of course we indulge. "A hordeculturist told a friend of mine recently,

who in turn told me that palm trees can live to be 300 years old. They don't have rings like other trees so it's not possible to count them." Ed's respect for the medium is impressive. "I have no desire to mass produce the tikis", he says. In fact, his experience with the trees over the years has led him to see a change in the trees themselves. "I've seen where climate change has affected the trees," he begins. "The trees don't take as long to age as they did before. Beetles also are more evident, I never used to see them in the trees up until a few years ago." You can hear in his tone that his concern for the environment is sincere and runs deeper than just about maintaining his livelihood.

Ed doesn't just create and sell his Tikis, he wants to make sure that the client is satisfied and knows how to take good care of them. "They will last forever as long as they are kept in shade or indoors," he offers. For those who insist on showing them off outside and out in the sun, he does suggest putting a coat of polyurethane or Thompson's Waterseal on the piece to help protect their longevity.

Make no mistake, these statues will last. "I just bought a tiki on Craigslist back from a client that bought it originally from me in 1980," he explains. This could be the greatest example of showing the durability not only of the tiki but of the artist and local treasure themself.

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Rigg's Outpost **FISHING REPORT DECEMBER FORECAST**

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If you are a diligent angler you know the following: Bring a medium fast action spinning rod with a 5000 series spinning reel. Pick up some DOA Lures (big soft plastic) swimmers. Riggs will provide live shrimp and the terminal rigs. Oh, and that vintage bobber! The lures will be effective early in the morning. The shrimp will produce bites all day long!

The early bite will be the redfish. Dogged battlers and a never quit attitude is their fight style. Ranging from 5 to 15 pounds and great eating. Make sure you have a fish ruler. The slot size is 18 to 27 inches. Each angler is allowed one per day. The FWC officers peruse the river and will board your boat if they suspect foul play. The fines are steep so follow the guidelines..

Looking for fishy spots is easy. Locate the pelicans diving into huge school of bait. You may see snook and tarpon bashing menhaden and finger mullet. Just drift with the school. The air temps are are 75 to 80. What more could you want..

Rougher winter seas could deter some offshore trips but the beach is alive with pompano, whiting and black drum. Fish the higher tides when possible to maximize productivity. Again use the visual aids except if you find the sea gulls and terns diving in the ocean you're on to Spanish mackerel. A shiny lure will get their attention every time. Macks range from 2 to 5 pounds. That same spinning rod I prescribed for boat fishing will work just fine.

A ten to 12 foot setup would be perfect to catch the surf delicacy "Pompano." You will need pompano rigs, 3 to 5 ounce pyramid sinkers and sand fleas. Plus the secret stuff - The "Enticer." We call it the "Bite Exciter".. Thick strips (fish gum) packed with clam, shrimp, crab and sand flea flavors. With the shorter setup buy a whiting rig and tip the smaller hooks with shrimp or fishgum. Whiting are in the cod family. They are DELISH!



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
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
